



Agastache foeniculum

3 x 2 feet

Hummingbirds, Culinary

Get comfortable. Got your cup of tea? Let's begin. Lavender purple spikes (July through September) are cut fresh for flower arrangements or dried. Anise-flavored leaves and flowers make a refreshing summer tea & anise cookies. It's an easily grown, hardy perennial but reseeds if flowers aren't removed quickly.



Agastache Apricot Sprite

Agastache aurantiaca

Half-Hardy Perennial

2 x 1 feet Culinary, Tea, Bees

Add a sizzling blast of bright orange flowers (July to September) to mixed greens, ripe nectarines or mandarin oranges toasted walnuts, and purple basil, dressed with a fruity vinaigrette. Also, known as HUMMINGBIRD MINT, though the citrus/anise notes repel deer and rabbits. Slender, silver foliage adds sophistication to gardens & pots.



Agastache, 'Arizona Mix'

Agastache aurantica 'Arizona Mix'

Hardy Perennial

AM Sun+2 10 x 10 inches

Bursts of majestic pastel peach, sunny yellow or pale pink with apricot spikes and fragrant green leaves attract hummingbirds and butterflies. With drought tolerance and resistance to deer, it is the epitome of low-maintenance, high-impact gardening.



Agastache, Sangria

Agastache mexicana

2-4 feet Culinary Flowers, Beverages

Guilt-free candy straight from the garden. Lovers of heat, these lemon-scented whorls of purple-flowered, foot high spikes attract hummers (July to October). Imagine pink confetti over melons, suspended in ice cubes or starring in your child's tea. NOTE: Sangria pictured left.

Agastache, Sunset or Rootbeer

Agastache rupestris

Hardy Perennial 2-4 feet

Hummingbirds, Edible Flowers

Sweet, sassafras flavored trumpets share the colors of sunsets (bronze, salmon, smoky orange & purple), while spending summers above gray foliage until snipped to jazz up fizzy beverages or sprinkled over fresh, sliced peaches and ice cream.



TENDER PERENNIAL BASILS \$4.99

Grow outside in the summer and as houseplants in the winter. Because they tend to not flower much, if at all, you have more time to harvest leaves. Many tolerate less sun, welcoming shade from the harsh afternoon sun. They handle cooler temps in our greenhouse in April, so these are displayed and ready to go first!

Basil, African Blue

Ocimum x 'African Blue'

AM Sun+2 3 x 2 feet Culinary, Ornamental

Give it room to transform into a mound of dark green leaves with purple veins & flower spikes. Served with pork tenderloin, it opened up my eyes- it is edible! Best basil indoors come fall.



Basil, African Blue, Variegated

Ocimum x 'Varieg. African Blue' AM Sun+2

3 x 2-1/2 feet Culinary, Ornamental

Claude Monet might have wept upon seeing its pastel palette of white, lime and dark green splashed leaves. Just about as vigorous as "African Blue" with a milder flavor. Google "African Blue Basil and Lavender Pesto", "African Basil & Pumpkin Seed Soup" or "Blue Basil Whiskey Smash."



Basil, Aussie Sweetie

Ocimum x citriodora 'Aussie Sweetie'

AM/PM Sun 3 - 4 x 1 feet Culinary, Topiary

The first sniff is loaded with cinnamon, allspice and cloves, so please add it to peppers and anything Italian, just as you would Genovese basil. Makes an amazing 3', non-flowering topiary in one season which can be brought inside for winter use: the BEAUTY of tender perennials!

Basil, Pepper

Ocimum selloi

AM Sun+2 2 x 2 feet Culinary, Ornamental

Sturdy, polished, green bell pepper and basil flavored leaves are more tender and delicious grown in filtered sunlight to afternoon shade. Reddish-pink flowers never stop, but don't diminish the flavor either. Tolerates cool temps and the indoor windowsill very well.



Basil, Pesto Perpetuo

Ocimum basilicum 'Pesto Perpetuo'

PM Sun 18 x 18 inches Culinary, Ornamental

No flowers, just tons of rich, smoky basil flavor for endless batches of pesto and drizzles of basil oil over pasta, shrimp or fresh tomato soup.

ANNUAL BASILS \$4.99

All are Ocimum basilicum unless otherwise marked.



These basil last 9 to 12 months. PERIOD. Overwintering is futile. Reduce the flowering by applying a high nitrogen fertilizer monthly. All basil benefit from pruning for better branching, yields & flavor. All basil like warmth but this group requires at least 60° at all times.

Basil, British

2 x 2 feet

Withstands cooler conditions where other varieties fail! Starting with crosses between Thai and Genovese basil, breeders selected this unique basil for cooler, northern areas. The dark green foliage has the traditional basil flavor and aroma with a nice hint of Thai added.

Basil, Cinnamon

1 x 1-1/2 feet

Culinary, Ornamental, Bees

Red veined, green leaves and purple stems plus pink to purple flowers create such beauty, we'd grow it even if it didn't flavor fruit, pancake syrup, and beef. Don't be fooled. Not all cinnamon basil are created equal.

Basil, Dolce Fresca

18 x 18 inches

Culinary, Containers, Bees

Grew this for the Western Reserve Society and fell in love with its healthy, fragrant, bushy Genovese-type basil. Critics agree as it was named a 2015 All America Selection. Enjoy in a tomato basil frittata or pizza.

Basil, Deep Purple

15 x 15 inches

Baby Leaf, Culinary, Containers

The dark purple leaves are situated evenly in an upright fashion making for easy harvests which you can begin earlier than most basil as this was bred for baby leaf production and container growing. Stays purple!

Basil, Everleaf Lemon

Ocimum basilicum

24 x 16 inches

Culinary, Bouquets, Bees

Between the sheer size and late flowering, you'll have baskets full of glossy green, citrus-flavored leaves of this tidy, towering plant. Compared to Mrs. Burns' Lemon Basil, Everleaf Lemon has a sweeter, more complex flavor. Versatile, from garden or pot to fresh-cut bouquet, or star of baked chicken, easy pesto, scrumptious cookies or a refreshing wine spritzer.

Basil, Greek Yevani

10 x 8 inches

Containers, Weddings, Hedges

Genuine spicy, sweet Greek basil flavor comes in a neat, boxwood-like mound packed with 1/2" dark green leaves. Forget the chopping! Small, flavorful leaves make convenient garnishes and are easily clipped from the plant and sprinkled over dishes. This is a popular wedding table topper.

Basil, Gustoso

24 x 15 inches

Containers, Weddings, Hedges

The place we sourced the seed wrote "this fragrant Genovese-type basil is hands down the best tasting basil we offer." Bred specifically for container production with plenty of large, spoon-shaped, dark green leaves. I know it as the healthiest and most beautiful of our basil.

Basil, Holy or Tulsi

available late April

Ocimum sanctum

1 x 1-1/2 feet

Medicinal, Culinary

India's most sacred basil is steeped in the Ayurvedic tradition, and is used to manage stress, provide pain relief, lower cholesterol and boost the immune system. Filled with antioxidants, it also livens up pork and rice. Sensitive to chilly temps so we seed it a bit later in the season.

Basil, Holy Red & Green

available late April

Ocimum tenuiflorum

12 x 12 inches

Culinary, Medicinal

Known for its gourmet flavor and beauty as well as health benefits. Many sources suggest you can grow this indoors, but honestly, all basil adore the outdoors once it reaches and remains above 65°.

Basil, Lemon Meringue

Ocimum citriodora 'Lemon Meringue'

2 x 2 feet

Culinary, Containers, Tea

Somehow, in 2016 this basil self seeded right next to my kitchen window, in a 5" layer of mulch, after a fierce winter. It has exceeded any lemon basil we have raised for robust growth, large leaves and lemon flavor. You can infuse these leaves, overnight, in any liquid. **We still offer "Mrs. Burn's Lemon".**

Basil, Mammoth

18 x 24 inches Culinary, Food Wraps, Containers

Hailed by the chefs of Italy, we bring you the largest-leaved basil, famous for blanketing foods like basil and prosciutto wrapped peaches with goat cheese. You know it's mammoth by its ruffly, heavenly-scented foliage.



Prospera DMR & Prospera Red DMR

20 x 18 inches Culinary

DMR stands for "Downy Mildew Resistant," a disease that does NOT overwinter in our frigid Ohio gardens. The only way it appears is in the seed so we buy from companies that test their seed & add extra tolerant varieties like the green leaved "Prospera DMR," and "Prospera Red DMR," a dark purple basil.

Both are a "genovese-type," genetically linking their foliage to smell, taste and appearance of genovese. Even if the mildew somehow appears, ASK MARK. He has figured out how to wipe it out organically!

Basil, Sweet Genovese

18 x 18 inches

Culinary, Containers, Bees

Remains the queen of all full, Italian-flavored basil and the easiest to grow. Harvest weekly in its prime to keep the young leaves (which are the most flavorful) coming. Add 3 tablespoons chopped basil to 1/2 cup butter, chill and use abundantly over pasta, sweet corn, garlic toast and salmon.

OTHER GENOVESE-TYPE BASILS INCLUDE:

- **Dolce Fresca:** sweet, tender leaves and All American Selection winner
- **Genoveser:** 3" long leaves on 24-30" plants= LOTS of classic pesto!
- **Gustoco:** compact bush with large leaves for containers; strong flavor
- **Prospera DMR:** strong powdery mildew resistance (see entry to follow)
- **Prospera Red DMR:** red leaves also fend off disease (see entry to follow)

Basil, Sweet Thai

18 x 18 inches

Culinary, Medicinal

At first glance, this might look like "Cinnamon Basil" with purple stems & blooms, but its 2" green leaves are distinctly spicy, with anise and clove tones. Essential in Thai & Vietnamese cooking, beef, salsa and spring rolls. Research shows that Thai is high in anti-oxidants, -cancer, -viral, -bacterial, and anti-fungal properties, which is why it has been used for centuries.

I surrender!

It is May 2nd as I write. Customers are calling daily wondering when the updated 2025 catalog will go online. Despite 13 to 15 hours days for the past 2 months, I can't keep up. I wanted to insert the new varieties and not stamp a "next year" for varieties not available in 2025, but I need to get this out now, when you need it. It's not pretty, but you can read it now.

Bay Leaf

Laurus nobilis
AM/PM Sun

5 x 5 feet

The difference between fresh and dried bay is perhaps the most dramatic of all herbs. Fresh bay inserts a subtle cinnamon spice to chili, sauerkraut, lamb, goulash, curry, tea, vegetable soup and (ya gotta have it in) spaghetti sauce. I dry the bay leaf, pulverize it and put it into my dried herb blends.

Borage, Blue

Borago officinalis
AM/PM Sun

1-2 x 3 feet

Need a quick cucumber substitute? Make space for a summer display of periwinkle-blue flowers. Scatter just opened blooms & young, non-prickly leaves over shrimp cocktail on a cracker or "V-8" drinks. Borage was used to "cheer up the sad" and was an integral part of traditional summer solstice celebrations.

Calamintha nepeta var. nepeta

Definition of the ideal perennial: no dead heading with a perfect mound of deep blue flowers from June until after a fall freeze. Foliage fragrance, but it doesn't trespass. I consider it an essential for any garden plant that chefs call "Nepetinella."

Calendula officinalis 'Alpha' & 'Resina'
AM/PM Sun

2 x 2 feet

Bright blooms (Alpha is orange; Resina is yellow) are easy to see but their chemistry suggests a high resin content, so admire, infuse for a skin salve or try a tea for cramps, pain, or sore throat. Always consult your physician first!

Calendula, Ivory Princess

Calendula officinalis 'Ivory Princess'
AM/PM Sun

2 x 1 feet

'Ivory Princess' reveal snow white petals usually beginning late May. It is easy-to-grow, lovely in a children's gardens, valuable companions by vegetables, and charming in bouquets. Deadhead often. Calendulas love cool temps so if they sag in the heat, cut back by 1/3, and add a dressing of compost to revive them for a fall encore.

Alpinia nutans
PM Shade

3-5 x 3 feet

This tropical is the source of the very expensive cardamom seed. It must not only reach mature height (at about 3 years old), but always above 72° to flower and set seed. So plant it outside in May for growth, then enjoy the spicy, fragrant foliage indoors, from September through April. Cardamom is an easy houseplant since it's hard to overwater. Infuse leaves in hot cocoa and wrap seafood in its luxuriously warm, spicy cinnamon leaves.

Catnip

Nepeta cataria
AM Sun

2 - 3 x 2 feet

Since this is the classic "6-pack of beer" for cats, protect new plantings until they're established. For humans, a soothing tea can be made from 1-2 teaspoons dried leaves per one cup of water to aid in sleeping, colds and fevers. Remove flowers before they mature to prevent major self-sowing. Catnip doesn't mind a few hours of shade or morning sun.

Apium graveolens
AM/PM Sun

1 x 1 foot

Celery substitute, but MUCH easier to grow; no blanching required. Also known as "Love Straw" for its hollow stalks, which are perfect for sipping delightful tomato drinks and "Bloody Marys," during our down time. (Down time? Just kidding. Valerian tea is what we should be sipping now and again.) Stalks and leaves can be substituted whenever celery is needed.

Apium graveolens secalinum 'Pascal'
AM/PM Sun

1.5 x 1.5 foot

My dear friend & pro chef Don Jacobsen LOVES this parsley/celery herb so much that he was able to share some of his seed when we ran out. Plant next to the back door to use its lush, green, tender leaves, regularly in soups, sauces or anytime you don't have celery stalks or parsley sprigs handy.

Chamomile, German Zloty

Matricaria recutita (chamomila)
AM Sun+2

1.5 x 2 feet

Harvest is easier with larger flowers and heavier yields. Pluck entire flowers. Dry on a horizontal window screen. After two to three days, place a tray under the screen and rub flowers. Only white petals and yellow centers should fall through to tray. Stem and green caps may aid in digestion but are usually too bitter for Americans' palettes. We make a tea using one teaspoon dried herb per one cup simmered water for the occasional insomnia.

Chervil, Brussels Winter

Anthriscus cerefolium 'Brussels Winter'
AM Sun+2

1-2 x 2 feet

This European variety is larger and slower to bolt than ordinary chervil. Use fresh leaves & flowers in salads, soups, fish, white sauce and quiche, ideally cooked less than five minutes. Plant late April with lettuce since it will bolt into flowers with summer heat. Allow chervil to drop its seed, keep moist until sprouting & you will have fall/winter/early spring crops forever!

CHIVES

As soon as you spy flowers, snip fresh blades and blooms down to an inch. Use for a no tears, sweet, onion or garlic flavor or toss in a vase for an elegant bouquet. You'll be rewarded with a second flush of growth. Showcase in a butterfly garden. All are deer-proof.

Chives, Garlic

Allium tuberosa
AM/PM Sun

1 x 1-1/2 feet

Truth be told I want a prep chef not a pool boy, if I had my drothers. So when I spot an herb that is easy to chop (or in chives' case, scissor snip), I take it. Wide, flat leaves add a subtle garlic flavor to mashed potatoes. Sprinkle white chive blossoms over blanched peas.

Short on onions? Sub these thick leaves & edible globes for fresh use or freezing. Any time you need onion flavor, just grab your scissors. My "Secret Indulgent Omelette" recipe calls for cream cheese and chives' foliage garnished with edible chive blossoms. **ONION CHIVE VARIETIES INCLUDE:**

GARDENING BASICS

PREP FOR NEW BEDS ON TURF:

1. Lay thick corrugated cardboard on turf, mimicking shape of garden.
2. Soak the cardboard, or lay it just before a good rain.
3. Create a 4" tall frame with 4"x 4" lumber or field stones for edges.
4. Fill with 2 to 4" of compost (40# bag covers a 3 x 4 ft. area, 1" thick)
5. Optional: Mix in a bale of peat moss or high quality top soil.

PREP FOR ESTABLISHED GARDENS:

1. Clear weeds & define pathways (don't walk in your growing areas!)
2. Apply 3" layer of compost in growing area & bark mulch over paths.

SEEDING DIRECTLY IN THE GROUND/COMPOST (Ex: carrots, radishes, peas, cilantro, dill & fennel)

1. Make a 2" deep channel in compost.
2. Fill channel back in with sterile, potting soil for a great seed bed.
3. Sprinkle seed, spacing according to the packet directions.
4. Cover with a dusting of vermiculite, twice the thickness of the seed.
5. Gently press over row to insure good contact of soil to seed.
6. Water in deeply and daily until you see seedlings, about 7-10 days.
7. Thin seedlings, if necessary. Example: thin to 1 carrot seedling/inch

HARDENING OFF PLANTS IN PREP FOR PLANTING

Gradually get greenhouse grown plants (even hardy perennials) used to the brutal outdoors, by exposing them to cooler temps and wind, starting at a couple of hours a day to overnight, over a span of weeks. We try to do that for you before you purchase.

PLANTING IN THE GROUND

1. Dig a hole in compost-rich soil, twice as large as the plant's root ball.
2. Set the plant in so its base is at the same height as it was in the pot.
3. Pull dirt in and press gently. (Not a bench press- a firm pat.)

WATERING

1. At seeding or planting, water deeply every day or two until seeds sprout or the plant is firmly set when tugged, usually about 2 weeks.
2. After that, vegetables like 1 to 2 inches of water weekly. Herbs are generally less needy and only need supplemental water during a drought.

HERE'S HOW TO MEASURE 1" OF WATER:

1. Check your rain gauge weekly and pour out after every rain OR
2. Time how long it takes for your hose to fill a can with 1" of water. Usually I water over each plant for 10 to 30 seconds.

FERTILIZE with organic granular or liquid. We use "Sustane:"

"4-6-4" fertilizer for root, fruit & flower crops
"8-2-4" fertilizer for greens, turf & herbs
I am not a fan of "Miracle-gro" or other 20-20-20 formulations. Plants look full and pretty but herbs have no flavor & sometimes vegetables don't fruit well as overfed foliage covers your food and attracts bugs!

MANAGE WEEDS

with a 3" layer of hardwood bark mulch around plants or pull weeds

MANAGE INSECTS & DISEASE BY:

1. Companion planting herbs, vegies & flowers.
2. Covering with "Reemay" after planting but pull back for flowers to be pollinated).
3. Use natural pesticides as a last resort. Call us or county extension office to help identify insects or disease first.

WINTER GROWING

1. Choose plants that tolerate indoor conditions:
 - See tender perennials above plus parsley, chives, mint, ginger
 - Mildew resistant lettuce, radishes, baby chard & beets, arugula
2. Choose minimum 4" deep containers; drainage holes are a must!
3. Fill with potting soil, not garden soil.
4. Place near a bright window; supplemental lighting is always nice.
5. Keep cool (most like 50°) & water deep when top inch is dry.

CILANTRO FLAVORED HERBS

Year-round cilantro flavor begins with two plants put in the ground, late April. Allow one to flower, form seeds and drop them. Harvest from the other. Keep seeds moist until they sprout. As those sprouts grow, you will soon harvest them, as the other plant is seeding out. Repeat this "leap frog" until November, OR try Vietnamese Cilantro!

Cilantro, Santo

Coriandrum sativum
AM SUN+2 18 x 12 inches Annual Edible Leaf & Seed

This is the last to flower, giving you more leaf harvest time. Each part is edible with a different flavor: foliage (tart, citrusy), flowers (mild lemon), green seeds (limes!) and the mature, brown seeds (roasted orange). Honestly, we've been comparing several Cilantro varieties over the years. While they are pretty similar in flavor and all flower eventually, 'Santo' has performed the best for us.

Cilantro, Vietnamese

Persicaria odoratum
PM Shade 6 x 12 inches Tender Perennial Culinary, Groundcover

This looks, grows and is, in fact, related to "Smartweed." (Aren't they all?) Heat will not kill it, but afternoon sun will. Plant it in a shaded, summer garden, then a hanging basket, wintering indoors. No fuss.

4 year old/conventionally grown

CITRUS \$32.95

Like Ohio snowbirds, citrus spends its summers in the garden then vacations indoors before a fall frost. Two plants are not needed for pollination but bees or hand pollinating by paintbrush helps, plus:

- Avoid wet, soggy soils. Allow soil to dry, in between watering.
- Set outdoors, late spring, in full sun, protected from the wind.
- Bring indoors to a 60° bright window; add humidifier; fertilize.

Tender Perennial AM/PM Sun Culinary, Fragrance, Butterfly

Citrus, Buddha's Hand

Citrus medica var. sarcodactylis 6 x 6 feet Culinary, Fragrance, Butterfly

Just plain weird looking fruit, it is known as a fingered citron for its many finger-like projections. Not very juicy, its rind is the main event, perfect for candying or shredding (lemon zest) over sweet and savory dishes.

Citrus, Eureka

Citrus limon 'Eureka' 6 x 5 feet Culinary, Fragrance, Butterfly

Eureka lemon trees are known for producing fruit year-round, though the heaviest crop is typically in fall and winter. Fruits are vibrant yellow, oblong to elliptical shape, tart with few seeds.

Citrus, Kaffir

Citrus hystrix 4 x 2 feet Culinary, Fragrance, Butterfly

Yes, this is what our foodie customers have been asking for because of its outrageous leaves, an indispensable ingredient to Southeast Asian dishes. Their distinctive citrus flavor can overpower milder herbs so it's best to use these leaves in moderation. Generally, the fruit is overlooked as an edible.

Citrus, Key Lime

Citrus aurantiifolia 6 x 5 feet Culinary, Fragrance, Butterfly

Imagine picking citrus for Key Lime pie on Thanksgiving!

Citrus, Meyer Lemon

Citrus meyeri 2.5 x 3 feet Culinary, Fragrance, Butterfly

Because it's believed to be a cross between a lemon and an orange, the lemon sized fruits are more sweet than tart. Stretch beyond pie and perk up smoked salmon, or add thin slices with goat cheese and rosemary on pizza.

Comfrey

Symphytum officinale
PM Shade 2.5 feet/spreads \$4.99 Hardy Perennial Cosmetic, Honey Bees

Known for its historical medicinal uses from "knitting" wounds to soothing your digestive tract. Do a little research, make a salve, get curious. Be sure to dig, divide and leave some in the ground before it reaches a foot high or the violet flowers appear, normally late May to July.

CUBAN OREGANO \$4.99

We have met so many gardeners who've become discouraged with plants in hanging baskets and strawberry jars because they die so easily. Our "Jar Gems"™ survive despite heat & the occasional lack of water. They include ice plants, "Society Garlands," and these "Cuban Oreganos," the most drought tolerant of all.

Cuban Oregano, Grey

Plectranthus sp.
AM/PM Sun 6 x 8 inches Tender Perennial Culinary, Ornamental



This is a favorite cooking variety of the nearby Puerto Rican community. Gray-green leaves are arranged so perfectly on fuzzy gray stems that, I daresay, look unnatural! Equally perfect mounds don't trail like the other Cuban oreganos listed here nor is its overall appearance at all similar. People love its tidy looks and minty, oregano scent, inside or out in the garden. It's nice to have a plant that thrives on a winter windowsill yet doubles as a summer border plant among edibles.

Cuban Oregano, Lemon Leaf

Plectranthus 'Mount Carbine'
PM Sun 12 x 24 inches Tender Perennial Culinary, Aromatic

This sturdy, upright, velvety, silver bush emits a euphoric, siren-calling lemon aroma just in case you didn't spot it at 50 paces. I have experimented with its culinary side, infusing it for a lemonade. I suggest you add a small handful to a pitcher. Any more and it's overwhelming.

PAIRING CHILDREN & GARDENS:

Lemon leaf is a hit in a children's garden along with lamb's ear, pineapple sage, chocolate mint, milkweed, lavender, lemon meringue scented geranium, Mexican sour gherkin cukes, & sun sugar tomatoes.

Cuban Oregano, Marble

Plectranthus marginata 'Fosteri' sport
PM Sun 4 x 5 feet spread Tender Perennial Baskets



This survivor boasts dark green and chartreuse leaves, scalloped edges and a minty, oregano scent (like "Golden Ruffles") however the color holds up to full sun. For a stunning combination, grow as a ground-cover carpet with red "Coleus" rising up through it.

Cuban Oregano, Variegated

Plectranthus (Coleus) ambionicus
PM Sun 5 x 5 feet trailing Tender Perennial Culinary, Baskets

Hard to kill and edible! If we'd forget to water our own baskets on the porch for a week, they'd bounce back. Use fresh in Mexican foods as an oregano substitute. Add to chicken salad along with "Pineapple Sage." Try as a groundcover, in a moss basket, or on a sunny windowsill.

Curry Leaf

Murraya keonigii 'Patel's Select'
AM Sun 6 x 3 feet \$8.99 Tender Perennial Indian herb

Is available in very limited supply.

Curry Plant

Helichrysum italicum
AM/PM Sun 12 x 12 inches \$4.99 Half-Hardy Silver Garden

We originally discovered this decades ago for a moonlight/silver garden as it shimmers under a full moon. While it is not the true curry from India, folks have been known to infuse this in vinegar and then splash it over stir-fry, noodles or anything Indian.

Curry Plant, Dwarf

Helichrysum italicum microphyllum
AM/PM Sun 5 x 6 inches \$4.99 Half-Hardy Mini gardens

Butterflies will hover over the sweet, golden flowers above the silvery foliage on the regular and this mini-sized curry. Enjoy the beauty and fragrance. Helichrysum (see botanical name) has been used for centuries to treat a range of ailments, including allergies, colds, coughs, skin disorders, and liver and gallbladder problems.

Dill, Fernleaf

Anethum graveolens
PM Sun 12 x 15 inches \$4.99 Annual Bouquets, Pots, Butterflies

Dill is known as "the fish herb" because it's such a delicious compliment to seafood dips, soups and filets but most any grilled meat, roasted potato salad or picnic fare benefits from the foliage, flowers or seeds. Fernleaf is an improved variety and a 1992 All-America Selections winner, for its compact form, abundant foliage and performance.

Dill, Teddy

Anethum graveolens
PM Sun 15 x 15 inches \$4.99 Annual Culinary, leaf, flower & seed

Compact spirals of thick leaflets surround each stem, providing a lush appearance. Faster growing and more productive than the standard container variety. Harvest at full-size or baby-leaf to enhance chicken meatball soup, roasted fish, and grilled asparagus.

Epazote

Chenopodium ambrosioides
AM/PM Sun 2.5 x 2 feet \$4.99 Tender Perennial Digestive/Culinary

Traditionally, epazote tea was used, in modest amounts, for stomach cramps, intestinal parasites and liver ailments. It is a companion to refried beans and other Mexican dishes to "forego the fireworks." Use 1/4 cup chopped, fresh leaves per kettle of chili or black bean soup and add during the last 5 minutes.

Eucalyptus, Silver Dollar

Eucalyptus cinerea
AM/PM Sun 2.5 x 2 feet \$4.99 Tender Perennial Floral bouquets

Large, silvery blue-green, highly aromatic leaves appear to be strung on the stem. Yes, this is the most popular foliage especially loved by florists. Just cut, dry and arrange in fresh and everlasting bouquets. Folks also dabble with the oils for natural mosquito repellent formulas.



Fennel, Bronze


Foeniculum vulgare 'Bronze'

Imagine fine, feathery foliage with a bronze-red cast tickling yellow, "Queen Anne's Lace"-like flowers above. No bulb below, but licorice laced leaves are added to salads, fish, and soups. As seeds mature, cut entire stalks and hang them upside down in a paper bag to finish ripening and avoid self-seeding. Infuse dill or fennel seeds for indigestion but don't plant by dill as their "kids" will taste nasty!

Fennel, Bulb

Foeniculum vulgare
PM Sun 3 x 1 feet \$4.99 Annual Culinary, Butterfly

Shapely, superb bulbs do not bolt nor split easily and are ready early (before September) for picnic foods and grilling. A favorite fall salad starts with sliced fennel, apples, walnuts, spinach and pecorino cheese. PLEASE don't pick off the caterpillars below. There are plenty of fronds for all.



Swallowtails host on members of the Apiaceae family, which includes parsley, Queen Anne's Lace, carrot, celery, fennel & dill.

Feverfew, Single

Tanacetum parthenium
AM/PM Sun 2 x 2 feet \$4.99 Hardy Perennial Medicinal, Cut, Bees

Customers have successfully tried fresh leaves in a mayonnaise sandwich (to mask bitterness) at the start of a migraine headache, to reduce severity & frequency. Or just enjoy bouquets of single white daisies!

Fig, Black Mission- 5"pots

Ficus edulis 'Black Mission'
AM/PM Sun 3-4 x 4 feet \$14.99 Tender Perennial Bees, Culinary, Medicinal

This traditional Italian variety produces sweet brown figs from the growing season to fall! Re-pot incrementally, each fall, eventually ending up in a large wooden pot with castor wheels so that it can be moved easily into an unheated garage for the winter. Ours is named "Figapotamus".

Fig,Olympian

Ficus edulis 'Olympian'
AM/PM Sun 6 x 6 feet \$14.99 Tender Perennial Pots, Culinary, Medicinal

Try an award-winning heirloom variety, discovered in Washington State, where it thrives and produces large figs with tender purple skin and violet flesh that's succulently sweet. May reach 6 to 8 feet.

Fig,Violette de Bordeaux

Ficus carica
AM/PM Sun 4 x 4 feet \$14.99 Tender Perennial Pots, Culinary

Luscious black fruit with rich, strawberry red flesh adorn this French fig. Naturally dwarf & ornamental, this tree is very well suited for growing in containers. It ripens late (early to mid-October), but reliably. Mature size varies per training technique, pruning and winter die-back.

Germander

Teucrium chamaedrys
AM/PM Sun 18 x 12 inches \$4.99 Hardy Perennial Hedge, Bees

Since everyone wants this for a hedge, especially in knot gardens, get it early before it sells out. Lustrous green foliage bears magenta pink flowers late spring through summer, at the height of bee activity.

Ginger, White/Traditional

Zingiber officinale

AM Sun+2 2-3 x 2 feet Tender Perennial

Ease nausea on your next airplane ride by chewing on these rhizomes (underground stems) related to turmeric, cardamom, and galangal: all powerful, warming edibles. Dig up in the fall to use in stir-fry, smoothies & cookies, or if the powerful zing is too strong for your taste, try a tasty tea by steeping the leaves!

We've been growing this HARDY ginger, AKA Myoga Ginger, under the trees alongside our windbreak. It is an essential ingredient in Japanese and Korean dishes. Its young, pink-yellow shoots and emerging flower buds can be pickled or cooked, adding a gingery, zesty flavor to sushi, miso soup and stir-fry. Besides dappled shade, it thrives on humidity. Easy in Ohio!

The only culinary reference I have found for this compact, variegated shell ginger is that the leaves make a nice tea. Otherwise it is not edible. Bee & Butterfly magnets, Deer & Mosquito Repellers

Lavenders love well-drained, preferably alkaline soil (gravel mulches help) and bright sun all day. It will not tolerate waterlogged conditions. In fact, THAT is what kills lavender in the winter, not harsh temperatures. High nitrogen fertilizers and manure will cause these plants to flop over and robs them of their scent.

LAVANDINS, HARDY \$5.49

Lavenders in this category are hardy perennial. Generally speaking, they tend to bloom in paler shades, in July. These are the tallest spikes, bred for perfumes, wands & cosmetics, not necessarily eating.

Lavandin, Grosso

Lavandula x intermedia 'Grosso'

2-1/2 x 3-1/2 feet

Classic French hybrid Lavender, grown for its fragrant, dark blue flower spikes and vigorous growth habit, was known as "Fat Spike"; its large and abundant blooms used for bath, body & perfume.



Lavandin, Phenomenal

Lavandula x intermedia 'Phenomenal'

2-1/2 x 3 feet

Extremely winter hardy, fragrant and lovely, this begins as a compact, bushy mound of gray-green, aromatic foliage. By mid summer, long stems are topped with 5" sweet smelling, violet-blue spikes usually arriving before other lavandins. Blooms repeat in late summer or fall.

Lavandin, Sensational

Lavandula x intermedia 'Sensational' PPAF

2 to 2-1/2 x 3 to 3-1/2 feet Perfumes, Body Butters, Aromatherapy

This is the next generation of Lavender Phenomenal with incredibly large and thick flowers on sturdy stems. Broad silver foliage is thick, tough, and cupped, forming a dense habit with incredible branching stems. Extremely good heat, humidity and cold tolerance. Sweet lavender floral aroma!

PAIRING LAVENDER & BEES:

Lavender, with its vibrant colors and aromatic fragrance, not only adds beauty and tranquility to our gardens but also plays a vital role in supporting the well-being of bees. Bees are naturally attracted to lavender's purple and blue shades, sweet nectar and fragrance.

Lavender not only provides bees with a rich source of food but also enhances the bees' health. The nectar from lavender flowers contains essential nutrients, antioxidants, and medicinal compounds that support their immune systems, which in turn, helps bees fight off pathogens, parasites, and diseases that can weaken their colonies.

When bees have easy access to lavender flowers, the efficiency of pollination improves. The proximity of lavender to their hives allows bees to spend less time searching for food and more time pollinating, which not only boosts the lavender but nearby plants, leading to a thriving garden with higher yields and more diverse flora.

ENGLISH LAVENDERS most \$5.49

Lavenders in this category are hardy perennial. Generally speaking, they tend to bloom in deeper shades, starting in June. These compact bushes are meant for eating, medicine, hedges and mass plantings.

Lavender, Annet

Lavandula angustifolia 'Annet' PP28,867

Bouquets, Butterfly, Culinary

Like all lavenders, Annet attracts bees and butterflies, is not a favorite of deer or rabbits, and thrives during periods of heat and drought. Large flowers throughout the summer, whether planted in ground or in a large container, are this particular lavender's claim to fame.

BeeZee™ 'Dark Blue' is comparable to the classic compact and uniform "Hidcote" variety. With green to silver-grey foliage, depending on the season, it is more free flowering beginning its first year.

Lavender, Blue Cushion

Lavandula angustifolia 'Blue Cushion'

Hedges, Culinary, Butterfly

Forms a compact, rounded cushion of fragrant, evergreen foliage with scented violet-blue blooms from early June into late summer. Though it thrives in summer heat and drought, this English lavender variety is more tolerant of moister growing conditions.

Lavandula angustifolia 'Hidcote' Type

Hedges, Culinary, Medicinal, Tea

This classic English lavender is a resident at "Sissinghurst Castle, Kew, Hidcote Manor Garden in Gloucestershire" and other famous gardens of England. It is a dwarf cultivar with plenty of dark purple flower spikes for sweet treats (as in my "Lavender White Chocolate Raspberry Cheesecake") or savory dishes like "Roasted Chicken Provençal."

12 x 12 inches

Hedges, Culinary, Butterfly

Excellent performer boasts the biggest blooms on short flower spikes! Blue-purple flower heads, over grey-green foliage, are thick & tightly packed creating more color impact. With excellent winter hardiness and landscape performance, I would recommend this as a hedge in a knot garden.

LAVENDER PEAR CRISP

Fruit Filling:	Topping:
4 cups peeled and sliced pears	1/2 cup all purpose flour
1/4 cup sugar	1/2 cup quick cooking oatmeal
1 teaspoon lavender sugar*	1/2 cup brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon	1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
	3 teaspoons culinary lavender
	1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)

Preheat oven to 400°

Fruit Filling: Arrange pear slices in a 9" pie plate. Sprinkle with sugars and 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon. Cover with foil and bake 20 minutes.

Topping: In large bowl combine topping dry ingredients; cut in butter until mixture resembles small peas. Spoon the crumble mixture evenly over fruit. Bake 15 to 20 minutes.

Garnish with fresh lavender and serve warm with vanilla ice cream.

*LAVENDER SUGAR: Pulverize 1/2 cup of English Lavender in a blender. Mix with 1-1/2 cups of sugar. The flavor is more pronounced and can be used within 24 hours.

TENDER LAVENDERS \$5.49

Considered anti-depressant houseplants, these offer about 9 months of blooms from summer to winter windowsill, (why we tolerate the annual move indoors). Most bear lighter hues of not-as-tasty spikes.

Lavender, Fern-leaf

Lavandula multifida

Potpourri, Sachets, Edible?- You decide

Referred to as "French Lace Lavender," the distinctly deeply-lobed, lacy, gray-washed, green leaves display blue-violet, trident flowers all summer and into the winter, indoors. Its bushy foliage is highly aromatic with a hint of oregano and highly attractive to butterflies.



Lavender, Green Fern-leaf

Lavandula minutolii

1-3 feet

Ornamental, Culinary

Inhale. Taste. You may be tempted to sprinkle the blue flowers over carrots, potatoes, parsnips and other roasted root vegetables. Potted next fall, you will have flowers in the winter as this is blooming right now and most of the year, for that matter. Its sage green foliage smells earthy, like oregano, yet another "expert" likened it to "burnt rubber." Suffice it to say, if your nose likes it, your tongue is apt to follow suit.

Lavender, Herb Companion

Lavandula dentata 'Linda Ligon'

AM Shade

1-2 x 2 feet

Tender lavenders are often frilly and fancy, and this doesn't disappoint. Witness the feathery, light leaves with creamy white streaks and a touch of green. Some leaves occasionally revert to more green and can be cut out at the base of each stem. Light blue buds come and go most of the year. Handles morning shade, however flowers turn lighter. This excellent houseplant by a SW window is named in honor of a friend, Linda Ligon, founding editor of the "Herb Companion" magazine.



PAIRING WINE WITH LAVENDER CRISP

Notes from www.wineenthusiast.com

Start by deconstructing the flavors of the pear:

- HONEY: Pears have a complex floral sweetness akin to honey. Pair with Chenin Blanc (honey & orchard fruit, with refreshing acidity)
- VANILLA: Many pears exude a subtle perfume of vanilla's muskiness. Pair with a spicy vanilla California Chardonnay aged in American oak
- WARMING SPICE: Pears love cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon and ginger. Fruity Gewürztraminer features these same sweet flavors, helping bring out a pear's (especially Bosc and Anjou) sassier side.
- BUTTER: Pears were nicknamed "butter fruit" in the 1700s. Dry or extra-dry Prosecco has complementary flavors of pear and cream, while its fizz, by contrast, accentuates this lush texture.

NOTE: Riesling is a classic pairing with sweet lavender dishes as its sweet taste, flowery aroma, and subtly fuels lavender's fragrance.

 **LEMON BALM \$4.99** 

A few of lemon balms' uses include flavoring ice cream, teas, fish and preserving sausage. Lemon balms attract bees, fend off viruses, exhibit antioxidant properties, repel mosquitoes and are mildly sedative (think sleep pillow), yet mood lifting. (Huh?)

Lemon Balm, Quedlinburger

Melissa officinalis 'Quedlinburger Niederliegende' Hardy Perennial
AM Sun+2 1.5 x 3 feet Aromatherapy, Relaxing

Hails from the German town of Quedlinburg while 'Niederliegende' is translated from German as 'procumbent', a botanical adjective meaning 'growing along the ground without setting roots'. Just remember it has a higher essential oil than other lemon balms.

Lemon Balm, Gold Leaf

Melissa officinalis 'Aurea' Hardy Perennial
AM Sun+2 1.5 x 3 feet Ornamental, Relaxing

Brighten your shade with this compact, gilded, mildly lemon version. Matures each summer to chartreuse but pops up gold the next spring.

Lemon Balm, Mandarinina

Melissa officinalis 'Mandarina' Hardy Perennial
AM Sun+2 1 x 2 feet Tea, Culinary

Think tea with all the calming qualities on top of an intoxicating mandarin orange scent! "Spills" from pots, hanging baskets and along the ground.



Lime Balm

Melissa officinalis ssp. Altissima Hardy Perennial
AM Sun+2 2 x 2 feet Culinary, Tea, Medicinal

Lemon and lime balms have tiny, whitish flowers which go unnoticed by humans but not bees. (Greek origin for *Melissa* is "bee leaf.") Euphoric citrus fumes from a brush of your hand or the lawn mower grab the attention. Substitute lime balm for any recipe calling for lime, or better yet, add both.

Lemon Grass \$5.99

Cymbopogon citratus Tender Perennial
AM/PM Sun 3 x 3 feet Culinary, Teas, Thai Cuisine

Try a tropical, water-loving grass, popular in commercial teas because its bold, sweet, lemon flavor is released by hot water. Overwinter next to a sunny window, atop a saucer of water. This is not the "East Indian Lemon Grass" which is better at repelling mosquitos than flavoring dishes.



Lemon Verbena \$5.49

Aloysia citrodora Tender Perennial
PM Sun 4 x 3 feet Tea, Culinary, Bath

Bright green leaves exude a scintillating lemon flavor for charred green beans, any fruity dessert or cheesecake, and gin & tonic. May be difficult to overwinter, but each summer's growth provides plenty to freeze or dry for tea. We recommend allowing it to endure one or two frosts to kill leaves before taking it in for the winter. Have faith!

The new leaves will be better adapted to the indoors.

Lovage \$4.99

Levisticum officinale Hardy Perennial
AM Sun+2 6 x 5 feet Culinary, Medicinal

We site this very large, strongly flavored celery substitute in the back of our shady border. Seeds, leaves or roots are used, fresh or dried, in lovage soup, braised lamb, walnut pesto, chicken salad and even pain relief teas & tinctures. Tall yellow flower stalks make a dramatic feature display. Mulch around its base or provide extra summer water to prevent leaf scald.

Marigold, Lemon Gem \$4.99

Tagetes signata 'Gem Series' Annual
AM/PM Sun 6 x 12 inches Edible Flowers, Ornamental

Petite, marigold blossoms decorate finely dissected green foliage. Lemon yellow, perky flowers exude sunshine and a MILD citrusy flavor. Seek out nasturtiums, lavender, chives or anise hyssop flowers for an outrageously colorful salad or dry these gems for fettini over baked potatoes. It is well-suited for baskets or containers but trim to keep compact, and fertilize regularly.



Marigold, Tangerine Gem \$4.99

Tagetes signata 'Gem Series' Annual
Full Sun 6 x 12 inches Edible Flowers

Ditto for the entry above, aside from the tangerine color. If you don't fertilize often then put in the ground rather than in a pot.

lemon herbs, ginger, mint, rosemary, fruity sages, and more!

FRESH HERB TEA (or INFUSION if you must):
Bring a cup of water to steaming bubbles or just before boiling. Add a handful of fresh herbs. Cover. Unlike me, sip when not hot!

CHILLED TEA BY THE PITCHER:
Pack a pitcher with 3 or 4 handfuls of fresh herbs. Fill up with water, leave in the refrigerator for 6 hours to overnight and enjoy cold. I added fresh pineapple and strawberry mint, lavender, and lemon scented geranium leaves.




Mexican Bush Oregano \$4.99

Polioimntha bustamenta (longiflora) Tender Perennial
AM/PM Sun 3 x 2 feet Culinary, Container

Pale lavender, 1" trumpets perform with glossy foliage throughout the summer. Quite a foxy companion on your patio with the extreme oregano, hint of mint-flavor of traditional Southwest cooking. Add flowers to salads, just-out-of-the-oven pizza, & gazpacho. Have fun fusing different ethnic flavors.



Mexican Oregano \$5.49

Lippia graveolens Tender Perennial
PM Sun 4 x 2 feet Culinary, Medicinal

Labeled as true oregano or "Ore'gano cimmaron" in Mexico & the Southwest U.S., but botanically it's not an oregano. I would describe it as intense oregano with a funky cilantro flavor. Leaves are bright green & scalloped on woody branches which, if properly pruned, will look like a small tree. For authentic SW chili, look no further but be prepared for an intense, FULL oregano punch.



MINTS: Hardy perennials but not bullies \$4.99

- #1) Mints do not have to engulf small towns. Their growth can be managed, but in rare situations, like in a shady area you can't mow, let them go
- #2) 99% of the time we recommend you plant mint responsibly. Sink a 5 gallon bucket, with holes in the bottom for drainage, into the ground. Allow 3" of the bucket above ground to slow mint runners. Fill with potting mix and a scoop of soil. Plant. Prune wandering tips regularly.
- #3) Mints need not be planted miles apart to prevent crossing. It's true that a bee's territory can cover 5 miles however you can plant a variety of mints in 1 bed, granted you **keep flowers clipped**. You'll disappoint the bees but you'll thwart next year's seedlings too, or not....
- #4) Accept that Mother Nature wins and simply pull the seedlings that sprout in between mature pots of mint next year.

AM Sun+2 (More sun = needs more water = a larger mint)

Plant under Apple Trees, Containers, Slopes, Around Patios

Mint, Apple

Mentha suaveolens Drinks, Containers, Bees, Along Ponds
1-2 x 2-3 feet

The delicate flavor of Apple mint works best in fresh, uncooked preparations. Add to cocktails, mocktails & tea. Add whole or chopped leaves to popsicles, sorbets and ice cubes. Use to make sauces or herb rubs for poultry, lamb and seafood. Roughly chop Apple mint and add to chutney, dressings, jelly or brine when pickling.

Mint, Chocolate

Mentha piperata 'Chocolate' Culinary, Medicinal
2 x 3 feet

Get the sensation of a "Peppermint Patty." Imagine this dark green leaved variety in brownies, coffee, hot chocolate, cookies or frothy, fruit smoothies. Why not St. Patrick's Day Mint Chocolate Cheesecake Bars?



Mint, Double Mint

Mentha x gracilis 'Madalene Hill' Tea, Bees, Culinary, Medicinal
2-3 x 3 feet

This variety is also known as "Red Stemmed Apple Mint" for its ruby red stems. Think of a tea that has both the oils of peppermint and spearmint, or in other words it smells precisely like "Wrigley's DoubleMint Gum."

Mint, English Pennyroyal

Mentha pulegium NOT EDIBLE, Flea Repellent
2-4 x 18 inches

Not for pregnant woman or any cooks! Rub fresh leaves on pant legs to repel mosquitoes and ticks. Let it sprawl where your pets prowl to shoo away fleas. Want more? Let the blue flowers be.

Mints attract butterflies and bees, especially if planted in a sunny spot. Mints also repel mosquitoes.




Mint, Ginger

Mentha X gentilis Culinary, Medicinal
2 x 2 feet

Rare yellow & green flowers look best in spring and hold up well throughout summer. Fine, fruity, spicy leaves well with any fruit, salmon and Thai dishes but ginger mint lemonades, Margaritas & ginger mint syrup for drinks dominate.



Mint Habek

Mentha longifolia Culinary, Medicinal, Bees
2 x 2 feet

This is one of the true Middle Eastern varieties used for the authentic "Tabbouleh," (bulgar grain with parsley, mint, onions, tomatoes, lemon juice, EVOO, salt & pepper.) Two inch, very narrow, bluish-green leaves are the most unique in our mint collection.

Mint, Julep

Mentha spicata 'Julep' Mint Julep & other Beverages, Fruit Salad
12 x 30 inches

Start here if you want to concoct an authentic "Mint Julep" beverage. Speaking of this, it is believed to originate in the southern United States during the 18th century. US Senator Henry Clay of Kentucky introduced the Mint Julep drink to Washington, DC at the Round Robin Bar in the Willard Hotel. Though recipes vary, THIS mint variety remains constant.

Mint, Kentucky Colonel

Mentha spicata 'Kentucky Colonel' Culinary, Medicinal, Bees
2-3 x 3 feet

Add clean, sweet, spearmint to "Mint Chimichurri" - a South American condiment with garlic, mint, parsley, vinegar, olive oil, red pepper flakes and salt. Slather this over lamb, steak, and grilled anything!



Mint, Mojito

Mentha x villosa Cocktails, Bees, Culinary, Tea, Butterfly
2-3 x 3 feet

Mojito cocktails are made with rum, sugar, lime juice and this plant, with roots that are directly from Cuba. Its mild, not pungent or overly sweet flavor is just perfect for strawberry mojito pops, lemonade or smoothies.

Mint, Orange

Mentha aquatica 'Citrata' Culinary, Bees, Pots, Bath, Flea Repellent
2 x 3 feet

Add one cup of these bronzy green, round leaves, a cup of "Pineapple Sage", and a cup of any lemon herb to two quarts of water. Refrigerate for six hours. Enjoy refreshing, bubbly, flavored water. Or add a citrusy mint to fruit salads, beef or cookies. Marinate leaves or blue flowers in vinegar to eat or add to your bath.

Mint, Peppermint

Mentha piperata Tea, Culinary, Medicinal, Anti-Mosquito
2-3 x 3 feet

Peppermint's versatility and ease in growing makes it THE beginner's herb. Smooth, shiny, dark green leaves are a boost to brownies, candy, stuffy noses, indigestion and mild headaches. This is the mint in "Mitchell's Homemade Chocolate Mint Ice Cream."



Mint, Pineapple

Mentha suaveolens 'Variegata' Culinary, Ornamental, Container
2 x 3 feet

White and green variegated leaves remain, even in summer heat. Care to try this over citrus and pomegranates, or mango sorbet? Fresh pineapple mint tea is an escape!



Mint, Strawberry

Mentha spicata 'Strawberry' Culinary, Beverages, Smoothies & Sorbets
2 x 2 feet

Close your eyes. Breathe in the delicate strawberry fragrance. Use it as you would spearmint, the dominant flavor. Naturally leans toward fruity or spinach salads, drinks and iced tea. It can reseed, so pull out seedlings.



Mushroom Plant

This fast growing New Guinea native bears green, glossy leaves containing large amounts of iron, vitamin C and a special mushroom flavor.

Add its raw, crispy foliage to spinach salad or tuck it in sandwiches. Mushroom flavor increases with cooking, so add it at the last minute of cooking.

NASTURTIIUM \$4.99



Tropaelum, the scientific name literally means "nose-twister" or "nose-tweaker." It earned the common name "Nasturtium" due to its peppery tang like watercress, which bears the botanical name *Nasturtium officinale*. Tear up the leaves & flowers for a salad. Use its fruits (unripened seeds) as caper substitutes. In pots, nasturtiums require faithful fertilizing, but they thrive better in our gardens.

Tropaeolum majus, are trained to climb or spread while the bush types (*Tropaeolum minus*) mound. Here's how to grow them:

Everybody's favorite in mixed containers for its compact growth that politely spills over, and its beauty before it even flowers. Plant a pot of nasturtiums with chives, lettuce, & a patio tomato for a summer's worth of salad. Added bonus: the flowers taste like a cool radish!



Empress of India

Tropaeolum majus 'Empress of India'

Like the exotic, deep red flowers but LOVE the dark green foliage especially in a patio pot with purple basil, "Gem Marigolds, and other colorful foliage and edible flowers.

This well branched single and double, two inch flowers in yellow, orange and deep red. 18 inch bushes of light green foliage.



Jewel Mix

Nasturtium, Phoenix

Tropaeolum minus

Instead of their usual rounded shape, the petals of every bloom on this British introduction are "cut" into 3 to 4 points, like flames. The blooms arise in bright and pastel shades of the classic golds, oranges, and reds well as creams, peaches, and salmons. Many petals are brushed with mahogany near the base. Can grow upright in pots or trailing in baskets.

Nasturtium, Strawberry Cream

Tropaeolum majus

Mix of cream-colored and red spots and rich red blooms. The green leaves create interesting patterns. American natives are suitable for herb gardens, covering banks, hanging baskets, and other containers.



Olive, Arbequina

Olea europaea 'Arbequina'

Mark's 6 footer provided a mason jar full of the best tasting olives. The process takes salt, water, & vinegar plus a month or two. No complicated equipment, just a little care. Olive trees need all day sun in the summer and 50° in the winter to set early spring flowers. Very drought tolerant.

BRINE-CURING OLIVES is easy. It just takes awhile.

1/4 cup kosher salt 4 cups water
1/2 cup of red wine vinegar 1 gallon glass jar

Pour the brining ingredients into the jar and stir. Submerge whole olives in this brine and top with cheesecloth or something else to keep them underwater. Do NOT cut them.

Cover loosely with a lid and put the jar in a dark, cool place. That's it. Check it from time to time, meaning every week or so at first. The brine should darken, and you might get a scum on the top. That's OK.

(What's going on is that your olives are fermenting which breaks down the astringent substance in an unripe olive. Fermentation is why I never wash my olives before curing. I want those natural yeasts on the outside of the olive to do their magic.)

I change my brine every month. I don't rinse the olives during changes either because I want the residue to act as a "starter" to get the next batch of brine going. Whole olives can take 6 months to cure. Taste them when you change the brine to see if the bitterness is gone.

Once cured, store the olives in the brine, or drain and completely cover in extra-virgin olive oil. To this you can add flavorings, such as dried oregano, chilli or fennel seeds.

Dry sherry & other dry wines, OR on a very light and crisp white wine, (like Sauvignon Blanc) balance the olives' saltiness and flavor.

TUSCAN MUSHROOM PIZZA

- pizza dough for 12 to 14" crust
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons fresh rosemary
- 1 cup coarsely chopped mushroom plant leaves
- 1/3 to 1/2 cup pesto
- 1/2 cup havarti cheese, shredded
- 1/2 cup white cheddar, shredded
- 10 to 12 sun-dried tomatoes, 1" pieces

Prepare & roll out pizza dough. Place on parchment-lined pizza pan.

In a sauté pan over medium heat, add olive oil & heat for a moment. Add the minced garlic and rosemary and cook for a minute or two. Toss in the mushroom leaves. Stir and turn off the heat, but keep the pan on the burner.

Preheat the oven to 425°

Brush edges of the crust with olive oil. Spread a layer of pesto over crust. Sprinkle cheeses over pizza. Top with sun-dried tomatoes. Bake for 10 minutes. Add the mushroom mixture and bake 2 minutes more or until crust is golden brown.

Hearty and flavorful mushroom pizza pairs well with a light-bodied red wine like Pinot Noir or fresh Beaujolais. You could also go with a medium-bodied white wine like Chardonnay or Chenin Blanc.

OREGANO \$4.99

Oreganos thrive in Mediterranean conditions. They worship the sun, heat and well drained soils. Flavor is actually diminished by high powered fertilizers. Use an organic (4-6-4) fertilizer at planting, with annual dressings. Except for Sweet Marjoram, most are winter hardy. A couple are better in pots than on (dinner) plates and the stinkiest ones should be thrown in a bath for sore muscles.



Oregano, Chef's Greek

Origanum vulgare subsp. hirtum

AM/PM Sun 2-3 x 3 feet

Hardy Perennial
Culinary, Bees, Butterfly, Bath

Don't confuse this one with the purple flowered ornamental oregano. THIS ONE'S FOR COOKING. It is still a vigorous grower, which forms 3 to 4 foot clumps, so give it room to grow. Harvest frequently. Scatter flowers or leaves over pizza, spaghetti, meats or stews, venison & other "manly" fare.

Oregano, Golden Crisp

Origanum vulgare 'Dr. letswart'

PM Shade 3 x 12 inches

Hardy Perennial
Containers, Bees, Rock Gardens

Clumps of round, golden, crinkly leaves offer a mild fragrance but beware: avoid hot afternoon sun or this oregano will burn to a crisp. One foot, pale lavender spikes will still appear midsummer, a plus for area bees. Small enough for rock gardens or patio containers.

Oregano, Hot & Spicy

Origanum vulgare 'Hot & Spicy'

AM/PM Sun 1-3 x 3 feet

Hardy Perennial
Culinary, Bees, Butterfly, Bath

We thought "Chef's Greek" had a strong flavor. This is for the person that really loves intense, oregano flavor plus a kick. Use with care in sassy salsa and chile dishes.

Oregano, Italian

Origanum x majorana

AM/PM Sun 1-2 x 3 feet

Half-Hardy Perennial
Culinary, Bees, Butterfly, Bath

If I could only grow five herbs, this would be one of them. With the upright productive growth of a typical oregano but the sweetness of a sweet marjoram, this is a marriage of heavenly proportions. Try pesto with oregano, pinenuts, garlic, parmesan, olive oil, salt and pepper. Blend, toss into hot pasta, top with lemon zest and more parmesan. Add a glass of wine. Done!

Oregano, Kent Beauty

Origanum 'Kent Beauty'

AM/PM Sun 6 x 16 inches

Hardy Perennial
Ornamental Cascading Basket

Instead of eating, simply enjoy this trailing mound of powdery blue-green foliage. Summer through fall, it bears drooping heads of hop-like bracts in a blend of shrimp pink, green and cream. Terrific in containers, draped over walls or in the sunny rock garden.

Oregano, Sweet Marjoram

Origanum majorana

AM/PM Sun 1-2 x 2 feet

Annual
Culinary, Bees, Baths

Sweet Marjoram is an annual oregano. Its sweeter, more delicate flavor works well with eggs, vegetables, seafood, rice, poultry, or pork. It is a good muscle ache reliever in bath while it also eases allergy symptoms.



Oregano, Variegated

Origanum vul. 'White Anniversary'

PM Shade 4 x 12 inches

Hardy Perennial
Pot, Ornamental

You only need look left to see its beauty. Now, imagine a mild "Sweet Marjoram" taste and white flowers for mixed containers, strawberry jars, bed edges or a rock garden.

Oregano Zaatar

Origanum syriacum

Culinary, Containers

Native to the Mediterranean where it has flavored meals for thousands of years, soft gray-green leaves exhibit flavors of sweet marjoram, thyme and oregano. Harvest often for eating and keeping it compact. Not to be confused with Z'atar, an herbal blend of several ingredients.

PARSLEY \$4.99

New gardener or cook? Start with parsley. In ground or in a pot, you will reap handfuls luckily, as you'll use it by the cupful in the kitchen. Most prefer sun, but we have a shade variety and even parsley ROOT!

Most parsleys do not form a tap root like this "old country" variety, lending a deeper parsley flavor to soups & stews. You can also roast like any other root vegetable and enjoy the leaves like any other parsley.

Mistakenly added too much sage, garlic or chile peppers to your dish? Add a cup of these thick, juicy leaves before you render it inedible. Impart a little vitamin A, C, iron, and magnesium to scallops with parsley butter, or bleu cheese, parsley shrimp.

Parsley, Japanese Mitsuba

Cryptotaenia japonica'

PM Shade 24 x 8 inches

Biennial
Culinary for Wet Shade

Native to East Asia, where it is used as a seasoning and potency tonic. Leaves and roots are eaten. While sprouts are eaten in salads. All parts are edible. However some people report skin irritation from repeated use. Parsley from eating huge quantities. The flavor is said to be akin to parsley, plus parsley, sorrel, and cilantro.

Parsley, Triple Curled

Petroselinum crispum 'Krausa'

PM Sun 1 x 1-1/2 feet

Biennial
Culinary, Butterfly

Mark specifically requests this variety for the great flavor AND good looks. Cleanses breath too! Best used fresh, though frozen works but bypass dried parsley. Freeze leaves in a single layer and pop in a freezer bag, or process with olive oil, pour mix into ice cube trays, freeze & store.

Patchouli

Pogostemon cablin (patchouli)

PM Shade 1 x 2 feet

Easy to grow, inside or out, just give it room. Bring in before 1st fall frost. Flower clusters will rob some of the leaf scent so prevent flowering by giving it 12 hours of light, indoors. Broad, heart-shaped leaves are sliced for egg dishes & mole verde, or used whole to wrap meat, fish, and even tamales before cooking, leaves and all! Find a moist, large spot, as it will grow up to five feet this year.



ROSEMARY starting at \$4.99 with larger pots available

Years ago, three of our rosemaries earned three first places at the Cleveland Botanical Gardens Flower Show. Here's the treatment they received:
Outdoors (May - Oct.): Grow in full **AM/PM Sun** in a raised bed with well draining soil. Fertilize & water deeply at planting and rarely after that.
Indoors (Oct - April): #1. Re-pot into a larger pot with fresh soil in the fall OR root prune, adding fresh soil and put back in the original pot.
 #2. Place next to a sunny, cold (55-60°), and preferably drafty window. (Old-fashioned windows grow the best plants!)
 #3. Don't overwater. Water only when soil feels dry and the pot is lighter in weight, not by the calendar.

Rosemary, Arp
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Arp'
 3-4 x 4 feet Culinary, Medicinal, Butterfly
 Perhaps the hardiest of all varieties, however our winter breezes are still too stiff. The growth is somewhat unpredictable but generally thick and well branched. Leaves and blooms enhance jams, orange sauce, poultry and lamb. Pale blue, early spring flowers appear while it is still indoors.

Rosemary, Creeping
Rosmarinus officinalis prostratus
 2-3 feet trailing Container, Topiary, Bonsai
 This creeping variety gravitates to containers & hanging baskets and easily wraps around. Perfect for Victorian centerpieces. Fresh rosemary for Thanksgiving? Snatched from your table? PRICELESS!

Rosemary, Foxtail
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Foxtail'
 2 x 2 feet Culinary, Shish-kabob, Winter Houseplant
 Test each rosemary when you visit. If you like the smell, you'll likely love the flavor. Each variety is distinct. Appearance-wise, "foxtail" is big, thick and bushy and takes on a blue sheen once indoors for the winter. Lovely!

Blooming Rosemary attracts butterflies

Rosemary, Golden Rain
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Joyce DeBaggio'
 1-2 feet Culinary, Topiary, Bonsai
 Chartreuse and green, striped, lemony-laced leaves adorn this stocky, erect herb. Cool weather heightens variegation just in time for vibrant blue buds indoors. Mark's favorite variety for containers as it appears to be a mini alpine tree.


Rosemary, Gorizia
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Gorizia'
 4-5 x 4 feet Culinary, Medicinal, Topiary
 We call it Godzilla. Tom DeBaggio received it from Gorizia, Italy. Still, it's an appropriate nickname for its broad, easy to prep, leaves that are twice as wide as the standard rosemary. Light blue flowers spring through summer, are also larger. Tom described its flavor as "gentle, sweet and a bit gingery." I can taste the potato salad now! Stems serve as skewers for shish-ka-bobs.

Rosemary, Herb Cottage
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Herb Cottage'
 4 x 4 feet Culinary, Medicinal
 Escape the winter blues. Visit our greenhouse and you will be treated to these fluorescent blue flowers. It is a solid, well-branched selection, jammed with leaves and flowers. Excellent for bonsai, topiaries, roasted taters and foccacio, as it is most fragrant.



Rosemary, Hill Hardy
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Hill Hardy'
 2-3 x 3 feet Culinary, Medicinal, Topiary
 Long ago, we were impressed with its healthy growth habit. Not hardy in our open fields, but then all rosemaries have a difficult time overwintering. You can try and plant it against a South wall and protect it from brisk winds with something transparent (not mulch!), but inside every winter is best.

Rosemary, Large-creeping
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Lockwood DeForest'
 2 x 5 feet Cascading Walls, Baskets
 Pale blue flowers arrive on your winter window-sill after a summer's worth of sunshine, spilling over baskets and walls. This variety, AKA "Santa Barbara" rosemary, pairs well with apricots, oranges and bleu cheese.



Rosemary often blooms in late fall, aren't bothered by rabbits or deer, handles drought, & are easy bonsais!

Rosemary, Nancy's Wedding
Rosmarinus o. 'Nancy's Wedding'
 3 x 2 feet Culinary, Bees, Wedding Bouquets
 The USDA released this trial rosemary to a few select nurseries and we are asking customers to trial it. We want your evaluations. So far, we have found it to be very fragrant with balanced, amazing flavor and vigorous growth. We assume the flowers are blue, but haven't seen them yet.

Rosemary, Pink Flowering
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Majorica Pink'
 3 - 4 x 4 feet Culinary, Medicinal, Butterfly, Shish-kabob
 Pink flowers distinguish this strong, upright, short needled variety. Doesn't branch well but reaches amazing heights in one season. A great companion for the grill with long stems for shish-kabobs.

KEEPING ROSEMARY ALIVE OVER WINTER:
 "Sunny, cold (55°), drafty window" is Mark's rosemary maintenance mantra.
KAREN'S ROSEMARY SHAMPOO:
 Add 6-4" fresh rosemary sprigs to your favorite shampoo for shiny hair. Keep sprigs in the shampoo until it is empty.



Rosemary, White-Flowering
Rosmarinus officinalis 'Albus'
 3 x 3 feet trailing Culinary, Medicinal, Topiary
 The unique white flowers that cover this masterpiece by late summer, early fall, add to the legend of how Jesus' mother Mary placed her cloak over a rosemary while escaping to Egypt, turning the white flowers to blue. Rosemary and Mediterranean food (its native home) always pair well.

SAGES, CULINARY & MEDICINAL \$4.99

Sage, known as the "youth herb," is used to darken hair, improve memory, & even ease wrinkles. We use it in the bath to soothe muscles, drink the tea to ease nerves & indigestion, and you'd be WISE to add variegated varieties to your moon garden. You'll be amazed with the variety of shapes, colors, uses and hardiness. Sages love **AM/PM Sun** and the hummingbirds, bees and butterflies love the sages. Of the 600 varieties of sage, a few are edible & medicinal, but most are ornamental & attract butterflies.

Sage, Berggarten
Salvia officinalis 'Berggarten'
 AM/PM Sun 2 x 3 feet Hardy Perennial
 Culinary, Border, Medicinal
 Broad, oval-shaped leaves on this 2' herb make "Berggarten" the easiest of all sages to harvest and prep. Flash fry whole leaves in sizzling olive oil for about 30 seconds. Take off heat. Cool, crumble & use like bacon bits. It rarely blooms as its flowering tips often freeze.

Sage, Berggarten Variegated
Salvia officinalis 'Variegated Berggarten'
 AM/PM Sun Hardy Culinary, Ornamental
 Though it's a Berggarten, a few of the white variegated leaves revert back to green. Just snip off and eat them!

Sage, Dwarf Garden
Salvia officinalis 'Compacta' (Nana)
 AM/PM Sun 1 x 2 feet Hardy Perennial
 Culinary, Container, Medicinal
 Smaller leaves in a compact bush offers full flavor. It's my go-to for mixed containers and tidy hedges. Plus it's covered with blue flower spikes each spring that don't always get frozen off. Like many strong flavored sages, a little goes a long way. Sage is a nice contrast with sweet or acid flavors, and is often paired with citrus or pineapple.

Sages are bee, butterfly and hummingbird attractors.

Sage, Golden Pineapple
Salvia elegans
 PM Sun 3 x 3 feet Tender Perennial
 Culinary, Hummingbird
 While I use bushels of these golden leaves in summer beverages (a cup each of pineapple sage, lemon verbena and orange mint in a pitcher of water), it is in its glory in the fall. Imagine the scarlet spires that you see on tangerine or green pineapple sage atop a 3 foot glowing, golden bush.

Sage, Golden Variegated
Salvia officinalis 'Icterina'
 AM/PM Sun 1 x 2 feet Hardy Perennial
 Culinary, Bees, Medicinal
 Our cuttings come from stock plants that survived -18° one winter. Golden margins surround green centers. Our obedient mounds create a 7 to 8 month show, posed in front of "Bronze Fennel," purple basil and other sages. Add to apples with braised chicken or butternut squash. Golden sage's milder flavor is easy on beginning palettes.

Sage, Grandfather White \$5.49
Salvia apiana
 AM/PM Sun 3-4 x 3 feet Tender Perennial
 Ceremonies, Bees, Hummers
 This powerful, silver shrub is used by native people to purify themselves (in sweat lodges during flu season) and their dwellings. Traditionally, small wands are burned to ward off evil spirits. Tiny white flowers draw the bees which is why it is often called "bee sage."

Sage, Pineapple
Salvia elegans
 PM Sun 3 x 3 feet Tender Perennial
 Culinary, Hummingbird
 Delicious, scarlet-red flowers on 3 foot spikes form in the fall as the grand finale. Use fresh leaves or flowers in teas, fruit, chicken salads, white wine and lemonade. Plants grow large but luckily don't mind frequent harvests. Pick lower leaves, which are more succulent, being protected from the sun. Stop pruning tips August 1st, allowing flowers to form. See "Fresh Pineapple Upside-Down Cake," page 55



PAIRING SAGE DISHES & WINES:
 Sage works well when rubbed into steak or infused into a creamy sauce. A strong red (Cabernet Sauvignon, Malbec, or Pinot Noir) would be a good choice for pairing with ribeye steak. The tannins in these wines cut through the fat and enhance the flavor of the steak. Balance creamy sauces with a buttery Chardonnay or Sauvignon Blanc.
 Sages don't only come in dozens of colors, shapes and uses, but a wide variety of flavors from savory to sweet. If you prepared a pineapple sage upside down cake, you might reach for a California Chardonnay, a Burgundy Chardonnay or a (red) Argentinian Malbec.

Sage, Purple
Salvia officinalis 'Purpurea'
 AM/PM Sun 2 x 3 feet Hardy Perennial
 Culinary, Ornamental
 Purple new leaves mature partially green creating a bi-colored look. Flavor is slightly less robust so it's ideal for cooks who've not used sage before. I started adding sage to my spaghetti sauce after a friend told me it mimics a sausage flavor since sage is typically the primary herb in sausage. Some believe it is the most potent sage medicinally with teas to relieve cough and chest congestion.

Sage, Tangerine
Salvia elegans 'Tangerine'
 PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Tender Perennial
 Culinary, Tea
 Flowers are the same as "Pineapple Sage" with a fruitier, rather than tropical, flavor. Plants are more compact as well. It flowers from about May until you allow it to freeze. Lug it inside and it'll continue to flower a good part of winter. Blooming show isn't as loud as "Pineapple Sage," however it lasts much longer throughout the season. I've used the flora and foliage to make a fruity syrup for herbal sodas and handfuls of it and "Lemon Verbena" to flavor good old drinking water.



Sage, Tricolor
Salvia officinalis 'Tricolor'
 AM/PM Sun 2 x 3 feet Half-Hardy Perennial
 Culinary, Ornamental
 Pink, white and green colored leaves display well in the garden or the dinner table for cooks who enjoy a little less intense sage flavor. Not always hardy, so root cuttings in fall, and bring them in.

POWDERY MILDEW SPRAY: 2 Tablespoons baking soda 2 Tablespoons oil (cooking or *summer oil) 1 gallon water
 Pour baking soda and oil into a rinsed out milk jug and add water. Shake vigorously. Label. Pour some into a spray bottle and drench all sides of leaves until it drips, every 7-10 days. Great on roses, bee balm, sage and rosemary. Update: NOT effective on Basil Downy Mildew (that's a different disease) but it works on spider mites and aphids too. (*Summer oil is found in the fruit tree spray section; do not use dormant oil.)

St. Johnswort \$4.99
Hypericum perforatum
 AM/PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Hardy Perennial
 Medicinal Groundcover, Bees
 Its name is a nod to the yellow blooms arriving in late June, around the annual feast of St. John. Noted as a remedy for many ailments, including insomnia, depression, bladder problems, and pulmonary complaints, but do your research. May cause skin rash or not play well with pharmaceuticals.

Salad Burnet or Di-yu \$4.99
Sanguisorba minor
 AM/PM Sun 12 x 12 inches Hardy Perennial
 Culinary, Medicinal
 Crumble cucumber flavored young shoots and fruits over salads, and infuse in tomato juice or vinegar. Its rosette form looks lacy in herbal lawns. Referred to in "traditional chinese medicine" as "Di-yu" where it is used to stop bleeding. Like borage, harvest when foliage, flower or fruit is young.

SIMPLE FLOWER SALAD
 Change of pace salad toppings:
 - salad burnet & borage flowers/leaves
 - kale, beet leaf & arugula micro-greens
 Toss with lettuce, lemon juice, sea salt flakes and some olive oil.



SAVORIES \$4.99
 Substitute the herb "savory" for salt or black pepper. Embellish recipes like: cream cheese crepes, roasted lemon/garlic chicken, fresh pasta with garlic sauce, and any roasted meat. You can dry savory for a salt substitute blend, beef or grilling rub, or even a chile/taco blend.
 AM/PM Sun Culinary, Honey Bees, Medicinal, Tea, Rock Garden

Savory, Summer Compact Annual
Satureja hortensis 7 x 7 inches Containers
 This selection has the same peppery-thyme flavor as standard summer savory only it stays smaller and bushier; ideal for containers. Cut for fresh use once the plants have become established. Entire plants can be harvested when flowers are in the bud stage for winter use. To dry, hang the plant in a warm, dark, well-ventilated location.

Savory, Purple Winter Hardy Perennial
Satureja montana ssp. illyrica 6 x 6 inches
 Bright violet spikes cover this aromatic, evergreen dwarf shrub. Compact enough for patio pots, troughs and crevices in dry stone walls. It's my secret flavoring, fresh or dried, over homemade pizza.



Savory, Winter Hardy Perennial
Satureja montana subsp. montana 2 x 1 foot
 Take the lead of Germans who call this robust, salt substitute "Bohnenkraut," meaning "bean herb." Edible white flowers mimic candytuft in appearance. Savories belong to a huge family with mint, basil, thyme and other herbs which are often used to ease nausea, flatulence, sore throat, bee stings, arthritis (even baldness) due in part to their antiseptic qualities.

Savory, Winter Dwarf Hardy Perennial
Satureja montana subsp. montana 'Nana' 9 x 9 inches
 For faery or rock gardens, try this exact dwarf version of "Winter Savory," with smaller, glossy leaves, delicate white flowers and a peppery flavor. Add bush basil and rosemary for an edible windowsill landscape. OR make a dry rub blend of sea salt with dried savory leaf, rosemary, lemon peel, garlic powder and minced onion. Rub over meat, fish and poultry. Grill or roast.

FORGIVE ME, "ALPHABET GODS"
 Having over 800 varieties of herbs, miniature perennials, succulents and vegetable plants, we strive to maintain some semblance of alphabetical order. We also like to keep general groups together on one page. To that end, we snatched the following, to keep the fancy leaved and the scented geraniums squarely on the next three pages.

Soapwort, Double Pink \$4.99
Saponaria officinalis 'Flore Pleno'
 AM/PM Sun 2 x 1.5 feet Hardy Perennial
 Cut Flower
 Brought from Europe, colonists mixed plant sap from its stems and roots with water to form a lathery soap, thus the common names of soap or latherwort (wort=plant). Bouncing Bet (Bet is short for Bess) is an old-English term for washerwoman. The scientific name deconstructed is: Sapo=soap, officinalis=plants used for medicine/cooking, 'Flore Pleno'= sold in shops. Pretty cool for this July through September double-flowered bloomer. Not invasive!



Society Garlic \$4.99
Tulbaghia violacea
 AM/PM Sun 1-2 x 1 feet Half-Hardy Perennial
 Container, Edible Flower
 As with most green varieties, this grows larger and more robustly than its variegated cousin. Separate pale lavender globes and use sparingly over salads, fish, or most any dish open to garlic. Linear foliage is an excellent substitute for dracena spikes in mixed containers.



Society Garlic, Tricolor \$5.49
Tulbaghia violacea 'Variegata'
 AM/PM Sun 6 x 12 inches Tender Perennial
 Container, Culinary, Hummers
 Deer won't touch these elite, silvery, slender spikes of green, white and pink. Bruise the foliage and you'll smell garlic, though it's not related. I suggest beginners start with the lavender pink flowers as garnishes. If you think it's too strong for the plate, then try it as a pond plant.

Sorrel, Blood \$4.99
Rumex sanguineus ssp. sanguineus Hardy Perennial
 AM/PM Sun 1 x 2 feet Salads
 Enjoy its blood red veins that run down emerald green leaves for a welcome contrast to all our green herbs. Though not as tangy, it's still quite tasty. It doesn't mind water, in fact, it is considered a popular pond plant.



Sorrel, (True) French \$4.99
Rumex scutatus Am/PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Culinary, Medicinal
 Sorrel contains higher amounts of oxalic acid which gives it the perky, lemon, sour punch. A few torn leaves are a welcome surprise over salads, pasta and stir-fries, but not always beneficial for people with a tendency to rheumatism, arthritis, gout, kidney stones or hyperacidity (as sorrel can aggravate those conditions.)

Sorrel, Silver-leaf \$4.99
Rumex scutatus ssp. glaucus 'Silver Leaf' Hardy Perennial
 AM Sun+2 16 x 24 inches Ornamental, Culinary, Medicinal
 Interesting shield-shaped leaves washed in a striking silver hue look and grow right at home in natural landscapes. Alternatively, planted in pots lends itself to easy harvesting for pureed soups or fresh salads for a powerful dose of vitamin C, vitamin A, iron, magnesium, fiber, manganese, and copper.

FANCY LEAVED GERANIUMS \$5.99
 Protect these exotic leaves and flowers from the blazing afternoon sun. In fact, in hanging baskets, they perform best with AM Sun. Allow the soil to dry out before you AM water deeply, and fertilize monthly. These play well with herbs like parsley and vietnamese cilantro, and the begonias and sweet potato vines in the beneficial beauties section. Provide attention and enjoy color from spring to summer's end.



SCENTED GERANIUMS \$5.99

Plant outside in May. Pick a spot with well-drained soil, protect from harsh afternoon sun, and give them an occasional soaking. OR grow in pots, watering more often as drought will cause unsightly, dead leaves. Pot or bring them indoors by September. Large leaf varieties need big, 18" deep pots to overwinter indoors here in Ohio. That's when you'll see most of their pink, purple or white blooms, although some arrive earlier. Trim off the flower heads after they fade to encourage more blooms late into the season. That's smart for many bloomers.

ROSE SCENTED GERANIUMS

Atomic Snowflake

Pelargonium 'Atomic Snowflake'

This "snowflake" looks like it survived "3 Mile Island" with its random blotches of cream on its palm-sized, rough textured leaves. By season's end it might reach 4 feet across! Be prepared for a mild rose scent.



Attar of Rose

Pelargonium graveolens 'Attar of Roses'
2 x 3 feet Perfume, Pale Pink Flowers


"Attar of Roses" has been distilled for its breathtaking rose fragrance for centuries. It's been replaced synthetically but you can take advantage of this jewel in potpourris, homemade perfume, facials and rosewater. Try a nostalgic herb for a return to elegance.



Grey Lady

Pelargonium x asperum 'Grey Lady'
2 x 3 feet Ornamental, Tussie-Mussie, Dusty Pink Flowers

Sage green leaves edged in cream possess a mild rose scent with fruity overtones. A robust habit, finely cut leaves & dusty pink flowers add to its charm. Listed in an 1871 American garden catalog.



Logee's Snowflake

Pelargonium 'Logee's Snowflake'
2 x 3 feet Ornamental, Pink Flowers

Along with delicate pink flowers, check out large, heavily lobed, fuzzy green leaves with hit-or-miss snowflake splotches.

Old Fashioned Rose

Pelargonium graveolens
2 x 3 feet Culinary, Perfume, Big Pots, Pink Flowers

Old Fashion Rose Scented Geranium is the most important scented geranium for the commercial production of rose geranium oil used in perfumes, potpourri, teas, jellies and other delectable treats.



Skeleton Rose

Pelargonium x asperum 'Dr. Livingston'
2 x 3 feet Nose-gays, Pale Pink Flowers

Fine and frilly foliage packs a robust and clean rose scent. Softer scented, pale pink flowers offer the perfect beverage garnish. Sprinkle on top or freeze leaves and flowers in ice cube trays, at-the-ready, anytime.

Velvet Rose

Pelargonium x asperum 'Velvet Rose'
2 x 2 feet Culinary, Tussie-Mussie, Pink Flowers

We saved the overall best "Rose" for last. This luxuriously rose-scented cultivar is covered in soft, fuzzy, light gray, deeply notched leaves and large pink flowers, when they decide to show, on this upright grower. Overall most robust scent, easiest-to-grow and quite lovely.



LEMON SCENTED GERANIUMS

Fingerbowl

Pelargonium crispum minor
2 x 2 feet Fragrance, Decor, Bonsai, Pink Flowers

With leaves barely the size of a dime, you don't expect the big burst of lemon scent that comes from rubbing the leaves. The name comes from the old tradition of putting lemon scented water bowls at the table to clean off the fingers after a messy meal.



French Lace

Pelargonium crispum 'French Lace'
1 x 2 feet Culinary, Topiary, Pale Mauve

Lights up this page not nearly as much as it brightens AM sun-loving containers, as a tree element. "French Lace" is an upright sport of "Prince Rupert" so we know it's a fine topiary.



Gold Finger

Pelargonium crispum 'Aureum Minor'
12 x 6 inches Culinary, Table & Stemware Decor, Bonsai, Pale Pink

This superbly erect, lemon scented, laced-in-gold specimen doubles as a miniature tree in a tabletop landscape or bonsai. Elegant enough for decorative sprigs on champagne glasses or beverage stirrers but comfortably casual for tussie-mussies. Infuse leaves in cream overnight for cheesecake.

Gooseberry

Pelargonium crispum 'Variegatum'
1 x 2 feet Ornamental, Bonsai, Whitish-Pink Flowers

The inspiration for its name, gooseberries apparently possess a sharpness reminiscent of lemons, with a subtle tropical fruit sweetness. That about describes this variegated gold & green foliage with whitish pink flowers.



Lemon Meringue

Pelargonium 'Lemon Meringue'
1 - 2 x 2 feet Culinary, Potpourri, Pink

SOME catalog authors stretch beyond reality in describing their beloveds. However, this is not the case when I say, here lies the most euphoric lemon scent. Spot on lemon meringue pie!

MANY USES OF SCENTED GERANIUMS


These tender perennials came to Europe in the 1600s from South Africa, but their popularity rocketed in the Victorian era. Used as "live air fresheners," they were strategically placed in homes so that fluffy dresses would brush and release their perfumes. Scenteds were



used in potpourris and often in the "collar" that surrounded hand-held (tussie-mussie) bouquets, for the same effect.

Today you find them tucked in between herbs, in hanging baskets or containers, trained as topiaries or bonsai.

A Mulberry Creek original with pale blue flowers in the beginning, turning to white clouds as they age. Next year, they will refresh again in a blue hue.

According to Wikipedia, these herbs repel listed insects. Not sure I agree with all of these (especially herbs repelling aphids) BUT I whole-heartedly agree with companion planting. One of the principles of the technique is choosing a neighbor that might repel insects. Having planted herbs with ornamentals and vegetables, I know it works.

Why so many thymes? There are hundreds of thyme varieties, each with unique scents, leaf shape, growth habit and flower color. All of them listed below are hardy, but dividing every three years is wise. Thyme is at home in the kitchen from sweets to savory. Use tender tips, whole in recipes. You can pick out the sticks after the leaves have given up their flavor. Conversely, harvest just the soft top 1 to 2 inches of growth, and chop, stems and all. Medicinally, the active ingredient "thymol," is a strong disinfectant and antiviral so it was used heavily during the flu season. Ben & Josh got thyme baths for coughs, and it's still an ingredient in "Listerine" and vapor rub.

Beneficial Beauties: Collection of Pollinator Plants & Deer Repellers

Pollinators include more than just butterflies. The following plants may also attract bees, wasps, moths, beetles, and hummingbirds. We've collected **annual, tender** (pp. 24-26) & **hardy perennial** (pp. 26-29) plants that thrive under tricky conditions. For more blooms, clip the faded flowers, and fertilize with a gentle 4-6-4 fertilizer, monthly, in the warm season. Plants NOT favored by deer are marked with this symbol.



ANNUAL & TROPICAL POLLINATORS:

These plants have roots in other climates that enjoy warmer winters. Annuals provide the best shot of color and last only 9 to 12 months. Tender perennials, can live year after year, provided you site them a warm windowsill, indoors, when temps dip below 40°. These all summer bloomers play a vital role in entertaining pollinators from May through October, in between times when the hardy natives aren't blooming.

Mark & I have walked the Michigan flower field trials for several years. We purposely go on the last day, knowing the fertilizer drip has been turned off that week. In only 4 days, plants start to go down! We choose the plants that are thriving and filled with the most buzz (the bees & butterflies.) LANTANA HAS WON OVERALL EVERY YEAR!



Known as "Variegated Vicks Plant" for the minty aroma emitted from its velvety, green and white edged leaves. Purple blooms and drought tolerance equals a great basket. Water deeply; wait until soil is dry and repeat.

Deer Proof, Flowering Shrub

While it provides erosion control, covers up unsightly utilities, & provides an evergreen backdrop, we enjoy the huge clusters of vivid, deep blue flowers, spring through fall, all over this shrub. Plant under spreading canopies of old trees or add its lush foliage to tropical gardens and around pool areas.

Portulaca, Rainbow

Portulaca pilosa 'Hana Misteria'

Southwest Landscape



This succulent came from a friend and Ohio's treasured plantsman, Bill Hendrix. Performs and blooms spectacularly all summer for bees, butterflies & humans, due to its extraordinary heat & drought tolerance. Kept dry, indoors, over winter, and the show continues.

SALVIAS \$6.99

Most sages fall under the ornamental, or in this case, pollinator plant category, and are typically referred to by their scientific name: Salvia. Their tubular flowers are often just the right shape & length for hummingbirds, in particular. All sages listed below are **tender perennials**.

Salvia, Black & Blue

Salvia guaranitica 'Black & Blue'

3 x 3 feet

Gorgeous cobalt blue with black blooms emerge from dark whorls along the tall flower spikes, rising from lush, green, aromatic foliage. Adds a dramatic contrast to any garden. Drought tolerant too.



Salvia, Dancing Flames

Salvia vanhouttei 'Dancing Flames'

20 x 24 inches Hummingbird, Containers, Variegated Thriller

Summer through fall, spikes of scarlet, tubular flowers are the "cherry" atop a mass of yellow SPLASHED foliage. Our most spectacular bed in 2023 was a hummingbird magnet filled with strictly sages- glorious gold and green pineapple, Mexican, skyscraper salvias and 'Dancing Flames.'

Salvia, Hummingbird Falls

Salvia x 'Bodacious Hummingbird Falls' PP 33,891

2 x 2.5 feet Hanging Basket, Rare Blue Ornamental

Here is the first hanging basket salvia and a natural alternative to plastic hummingbird feeders! Although its anise-scented branches rise vertically when it is first planted, they soon cascade. The vivid, cobalt blue flowers steal the show. You'll soon see why it's aptly named HUMMINGBIRD falls.



Salvia, Mexican All-Purple

Salvia leucantha 'All-Purple'

4 x 5 feet Fresh & Dried Cutflowers

Rises to 4 or 5 feet tall by August, as fuzzy, blue spikes appear. Cut stems back 1/3 in June & July to promote more branching, flowering and compact height. Is an important pollen source for bees and butterflies in the fall. Florists have told us this majestic giant reminds them of lavender on steroids!

Salvia, Skyscraper Dark Purple

Salvia x 'Skyscraper Dark Purple'

20 x 12 inches Rustic, Mediterranean or Cottage Garden

Set the stage for a Tuscan scene with Mediterranean herbs and these towering salvias. Big, deep purple-red flowers flag down hummingbirds from above compact clumps of attractive, dark green foliage. Salvias are rated as the #1 plant for hummingbirds and deer don't eat'em!

Salvia, Skyscraper Orange

Salvia x 'Skyscraper Orange'

2 x 2 feet Cutflowers, Cottage Gardens

Bronze & orange tubular flowers erupt from tall, dense spikes beginning in spring and continuing until frost. If your salvias start to look unkempt mid summer, give them a light shearing, remove the spent flowering spikes and sprinkle on a fresh dose of 4-6-4 fertilizer. Works for most heavy bloomers.

Salvia Skyscraper Pink

Salvia x 'Skyscraper Pink'

20 x 16 inches Bees, Hummingbird, Containers, Cottage Gardens

Soaring 2" long tubular, pink & bronze flowers top this perfect patio pot plant. Better than TV, you have a front row seat to the hummingbirds. These waterwise, heat-tolerant, carefree plants flower from late spring into fall, providing a much-needed late-season food source for pollinators.

Sensitive Plant \$5.99

Mimosa pudica
AM Sun+2 1 x 2 feet Curiosity Plant

Known for its reactive, folding, fern-like foliage, it actually produces fluffy lavender flowers too. Its evolutionary trick of closing up, startles predators and reduces water loss. Be sure not to tickle it to death! In addition, the leaves also droop in response to darkness and reopen with daylight.

Shrimp Plant \$14.49

Justicia brandegeana
AM Sun+2 20 x 20 inches Novelty Indoor/outdoor plant

Native to Mexico, this tropical evergreen shrub features 5" arching spikes of white flowers enclosed in overlapping red to pink-bronze bracts/petals, somewhat resembling a large shrimp. If you can take in larger plants in the winter, it is an excellent houseplant, blooming 10 out of 12 months.

Sweet Potato Vines \$5.49

Ipomoea batatas
Annual
PM Sun 3 x 3 feet BIG Baskets

Sun or shade, heat or humidity, hanging baskets or luscious groundcover, these bright green and deep purple ornamental varieties are not picky. Grown in the sun, the colors are brighter and they need more water. In the shade they may green up a bit, but aren't as thirsty.

Tecoma or Yellow Trumpet Flower \$14.49

Tecoma stans 'Lonesp'
AM/PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Flowering Tropical Shrub

Known as "Esperanza Gold Star," this is an easy-to-grow shrub that sends up lightly-scented, yellow, trumpet-shaped flowers from late spring to late fall. Add the shrimp plant, (Dancing Flames) salvia, and a shaded (shell) ginger for a golden, tropical paradise! Vibrant blooms attract pollinators while its long, green seedpods act as a food source for small animals.

Tickseed or Coreopsis \$6.99

Coreopsis grandiflora 'Bright Touch'
AM/PM Sun 15 x 15 inches Carefree Container

Butterflies adore these bright yellow single flowers with red highlights. Its compact and mounded habit adds sunshine to garden beds, containers and natural gardens. Rabbits and deer don't like it, but we do, as it is tolerant of hot, humid summer climates.

Verbena, Vanity \$4.99

Verbena bonariensis
Annual
AM/PM Sun 2.5 x 2 feet Butterfly

This airy, free-spirited verbena is more compact. Wiry, slender stems culminate in vivid violet-purple flower clusters that entice beneficial insects and hummingbirds. Ideally suited to borders in smaller gardens and containers on a sunny patio. It's a self-sowing annual, which happens to be fine with us. Use bark or other mulch where you don't want it to produce a bunch of babies next spring.

Zinnia, Zowie Yellow Flame \$4.99

I've grown this for several years so I know it performs well under the summer sun. You are naturally uplifted when you pass by the fiesta palette of colors. Iridescent, magenta centers, circled in yellow crowns, pop up like a 3-D greeting card. We also offer LILLIPUT ZINNIAS that pack a rainbow of colors covering 18 inch mounds.



BUTTERFLIES NEED HOST & NECTAR PLANTS

Butterflies lay their eggs on plants, referred to as host plants. When the caterpillar hatches from its egg, it will feed on its host plant. Some butterflies use only one kind of plant as a host, whereas others use several or many different species.

FAVORITE CATERPILLAR HOST PLANTS INCLUDE:

- herbs like asclepias (butterfly or milkweeds), baptisia, citrus, dill, echinacea, fennel, hops, nasturtiums, parsley, rue and verbena
- flowers such as aster, black-eyed susan
- grasses like little bluestem and orchard grass
- shrubs such as spicebush
- vines such as passion flower and pipevine
- trees like elm, dogwood, pawpaw, prickly ash, sassafras, sweet bay, magnolia, and willow



Adult butterflies feed on flower nectar and are not as picky about nectar plants as they are host plants. Butterflies are attracted to solid masses of color, flower fragrance, and flower shape.

BUTTERFLIES NEED THE NECTAR FROM:

- herbs such as bee balms, butterfly bush, butterflyweed, catnip, chives, echinacea, mint, lavender, oregano, sage, verbena and thyme
- flowers like aster, black-eyed susan, liatris, cardinal flower, coreopsis, cosmos, lantana Mexican sunflowers, petunia, sunflower, violets, sedum and zinnia
- shrubs like butterfly bush
- vines such as passion flower
- trees like chaste tree & flowering dogwood



5 STEPS TO PLANTING FOR POLLINATORS

1. Include a wide range of plants from different parts of the world.
2. Use plants from the northern, more than the southern hemisphere.
3. Pack in lots of flowering plants.
4. Observe which plants attract pollinators and plant more of them.
5. Select plants for all seasons.

HARDY PERENNIAL POLLINATOR SECTION:

These varieties (pages 27-29) are hardy to Ohio and should remain outdoors all year. A monthly dose of slow release (4-6-4) fertilizer, deadheading spent flowers, and an annual dressing of compost in early spring is about all they need to come back year after year.

AGASTACHES: "Hummingbird Mint" \$10.49

Alluring, minty, lemon-scented foliage and tubular flowers draw hummingbirds, especially into the fall. Not only "attractive," but heat and drought tolerant, and generally not on a deer's radar.

Agastache, Kudos Series™

Agastache sp.

Bred to be compact and thick with flowers, this series of super hardy agastaches are nearly impervious to Downy Mildew. Their sweet fragrances and bright range of colors attract pollinating insects. All grow well here even during our hot, humid summer weather. Here are a few stars:



Ag., Mandarin Orange

Agastache x 'Kudos Mandarin'
16 x 16 inches Beverages, Cutflowers

Cheery, tangerine orange plumes last all summer while the plant remains tidy for many months. Float flowers and foliage in drinks. Goldfinches LOVE agastache seed.

Agastache, Red

Agastache x 'Kudos Red'
12 x 24 inches Hummingbird Magnets, Drinks

Glowing red-orange, nectar-laden trumpets climb branching stems to form lush spires above the fragrant foliage.

Agastache, Yellow

Agastache x 'Kudos Yellow'
20 x 22 inches Drought and Heat Tolerant

More yellow flowers per square inch than seems possible, rise 6" above foliage. Removing spent blossoms sparks another round of blooms.

Agastache, Peachie Keen

Agastache 'Peachie Keen' PP25886
20 x 26 inches Water-wise, Cutflower, Teas

Bears apricot peach flowers, July through frost, with complementary purplish-pink calyxes over tidy mounds of aromatic foliage. Because the calyxes (collection of petals at the base of flowers) are so colorful, this plant continues to look like it is blooming long after flowering is done.

Agastache, Rosie Posie

Agastache 'Rosie Posie' PP25857
20 x 26 inches Water-wise, Cutflower, Teas

'Rosie Posie' bears loads of hot pink flowers with magenta purple calyxes for a long lasting, multi-colored show. All agastaches here persevere through hot, dry summers and continually gather pollinators.

Agastache, Sunrise Yellow

Agastache x 'Sunrise Yellow'
18 x 18 inches Water-wise, Natural Gardens

Here's yet another vigorous and trouble free agastache for the bright sun. Scented foliage and numerous blooms attract hummingbirds & butterflies. Spikes of soft butter yellow flowers entertain June through September.

Allium, Blue Eddy \$10.49

Allium senescens 'Blue Eddy'
AM/PM Sun 8 x 12 inches BEES & more BEES! Pollinator

This was named for its attractive, pinwheel rosettes of blue-gray-green foliage which resemble "small swirling eddies of water." From late summer into early fall, clusters of light lilac pink flowers stand atop leafless stems like lollipops. Adored by butterflies and honeybees but not deer and rabbits.

Allium, Twisted Leaf Garlic \$4.99

Allium obliquum
AM/PM Sun 7 x 24 inches Native Gardens

Known as "Lop-sided onion" for its greenish-yellow flowers that wobble 3 feet high, "Twisted Leaf" (AKA) foliage. Attracts butterflies & other pollinators. Deer, is suitable for natural landscaping or low maintenance plantings, and it's edible! Transitions to ornamental seedheads until winter. Native to Siberia so we know it's hardy.

BAPTISIA or WILD INDIGO \$5.49

Baptisia comes from the Greek word 'bapto' meaning "to dye" which is likely connected to its common name, "Wild or False Indigo" (indigo being a super dye plant.) All are hardy but one, which is marked.

True blue June flowers form on this, among the oldest known, perennial. We pop the juicy flowers in our mouths for a fresh pea fix, though one individual I know, way over indulged in the buds and ended up with a minor belly ache. Bold, contrasting foliage turns purple after a freeze. Also, baptisia is a nitrogen fixing plant-that's free fertilizer!



Baptisia, Eucalyptus-leaf

Baptisia perfoliata
2 x 3 feet Half-Hardy Perennial Pot, Ornamental

Native to the dry, pine woods of the Carolinas, but it MAY survive a mild Ohio winter. Generally appears to pierce (see perfoliata in the scientific name) the centers of each stacked gray-green, circular, eucalyptus-like leaf which small yellow, pea blossom-like flowers bloom from the leaf axils, July and August.

Baptisia, Yellow

Baptisia sphaerocarpa (viridis)
2.5 x 2.5 feet Native, Prairie, Meadows, Butterfly Lure

Neon yellow, lupine-like flowers burst on the scene in June, providing an enticing color and a "McDonald's" buffet for "Wild Indigo Duskywing, Silver-Spotted Skippers and Hoary Edge Butterflies".

Bee Balm, Jacob Cline \$10.49

Monarda didyma 'Jacob Cline'
AM Sun+2 2.5 x 2 feet

Choose this for its true RED flowers, extra mildew resistance, vigor and funky beauty. They attract every hummingbird, butterfly and bee with flowers that infuse a nice cup of tea.



Bee Balm, Raspberry Wine \$10.49

Monarda didyma 'Raspberry Wine'
AM Sun+2 Teas, Medicinal

Tubular raspberry flowers are a magnet for hummers amid clumps of dark green, minty leaves. Single plants make a show, but groups

 Dense clusters of native butterflyweed arrive in shades of fiery red, orange, and yellow, June through August. Add sizzle to hot-colored beds. Slim, decorative seed pods (coveted by flower arrangers) later open to release papery seeds on silky parachutes.

Butterflyweed 'Ice Ballet' \$5.99

Asclepias incarnata 'Ice Ballet'
 3 x 1 feet Monarch Butterfly, Native, Prairies
 Native to wet meadows and swamps, it still grows very well in draining soils. The foliage emerges slowly each spring. Its deep tap roots prefer not to be disturbed once established. Mildly fragrant white flowers are followed by lovely four inch seed pods.

Butterflyweed / Pleurisy Root \$5.99

Asclepias tuberosa
 1-2 x 1 feet Old-time Medicinal, Dry & Native Gardens
 Give yourself and Monarchs a bright orange, hardy, medicinal perennial. Despite some major safety concerns, the root of the pleurisy plant has been used medicinally for many years, beginning with Native Americans. Like all tap-rooted perennials, it's best to leave it in place once established.

Butterflyweed 'Cinderella' \$5.99

Asclepias incarnata 'Cinderella or Carmine Rose'
 3 x 1 feet Monarch Butterfly, Moist Soils
 True milkweed can be downright invasive so we lean toward these vanilla scented, carmine rose-colored flowers as our butterfly sirens. Native Americans used the roots for a healing bath. *Asclepias incarnata* varieties prefer moist, wet, well-draining soils but also tolerant clay soils.

Swamp Milkweed \$5.99

Asclepias incarnata
 5 x 3 feet Native Gardens, Monarch Butterfly
 If you don't mind the aggressiveness of the native milkweed, choose this tall, moisture-loving perennial. Swamp milkweed seeks sunny openings of swamps, marshes, banks and ditches.

CATMINT

Catmint, Creeping \$4.99

Nepeta mussini (faassenii)
 PM Sun 1 x 2 feet Ornamental, Bees, Rock Garden
 So hardy, so easy to maintain! Small, white-gray, fine toothed leaves form a natural mound covered with blue flowers in June and occasionally fall. Although stronger and more pleasantly fragrant than common catnip, it doesn't attract the neighborhood cats (or deer), so it remains untouched.

Mass several together in rock gardens for oceans of soft blue.

Catmint, Kitten Around \$6.99

Nepeta x 'Kitten Around'
 AM/PM Sun 6 x 12 inches Bees, Ornamental, Waterwise
 Unlike kittens, this is a well-behaved, fast-growing, low-maintenance gem. Bright blue-purple flowers tempt pollinators, May through September. Catnip, its herbal cousin on page 6, is what we use for tea while this is sheer beauty.

 This native, multi-talented, natural beauty is the quintessential herb and our company's logo! See Mark's video on his gold and fly-preventing tincture.

 Extract immunity powers of these four natives by filling a mason jar with chopped leaves, flowers OR roots. Fill and cover contents with 1/5th 80 proof vodka, gin or rum. Put lid on. Infuse 4- 8 weeks.

 8 x 12 inches Dry Shade, Natural Woodland
 Magically starts blooming in early spring with delicate, dusky lavender, nodding flowers that resemble tiny Columbines. The small heart-shaped leaves also pop up in early spring in shades of wine and purple, turning green in early summer.

Epimedium, White

Epimedium youngianum 'Niveum'
 6 x 12 inches Dry Shade, Natural Woodland
 Since it typically grows only 6-8" tall, use this as a ground cover or along the edge of a shaded, woodland garden. Equally short white to pink flowers appear each spring above pale green, heart-shaped foliage, arriving fashionably late. All epimediums, extending the bloom time.



Gold Strike \$5.99

Epimedium 'Gold Strike'
 1 feet Magical Medicinal
 means "silky" in reference to the soft hairs on the lobed leaves and stems. Loose sprays of pale yellow flowers emerge in late spring into summer, sway above foot high clumps. The best part is how its fan shaped leaves collect rain or dew as sparkling jewels.

Lady's Mantle, Thriller

Alchemilla sericata 'Gold Strike'
 AM Sun+2 Cutflowers
 This old-fashioned plant is still popular today. Dense clusters of dainty, chartreuse flowers balance on arching, airy sprays above healthy mounds of scalloped, shiny, gray-green leaves. Charming in troughs or pots. Perfect for cottage gardens and lovely in fresh or dried floral arrangements.

Lamb's Ear, Big Ears \$6.99

Stachys byzantina 'Helen von Stein'
 AM/PM Sun 10 x 18 inches Lady Beetle Home, Tussie-Mussie
 Grown for its wonderful soft velvety, silver-green foliage. Its large leaves are a winter home for lady beetles and the collar around a hand-held bouquet (aka tussie-mussie). As it rarely flowers, it doesn't reseed but it can fill in spots nicely. Prefers poor, but well-draining soil.

SAGES vs. SALVIAS

Sages are the common name for the genus Salvia, so these terms are often interchanged. We decided to refer to the ornamental ones as Salvia and the edible or medicinal herbs as sages (on page 17). All are lovely, attract pollinators and appreciate a good haircut after flowers are spent. This applies to the following salvias:

300 miniature varieties begin with this 2 inch, greenish gray bush of a soft, fine texture. "Tiny Green" has the spicy fragrance of "Sweet Annie" but handles summer's humidity better. Artemisias are hardy souls and this one is no different, just 90% smaller.

Babys Breath, Alpine

Gypsophilia cerastioides

AM/PM Sun 4 x 12 inches Rock Gardens, Butterfly

Related to the florist "Baby's Breath," this species is well suited for rock gardens, rock walls or alpine troughs. Compact tufts of rounded fresh green leaves hold taller stems, studded by starry flowers from late spring into the summer. Petals are white with tiny pink veins. Divide in spring or early fall.

Blueberry, Tiny Blue

Vaccinium angustifolia 'Tiny Blue'

AM/PM Sun 3 x 9 inches Tabletop Garden

Could be the world's smallest blueberry! The flowers of the plants are also small and will cover the ground in 45 days later, pea-sized, sweet, light blue fruits develop. The foliage is deep burgundy with reddish stems. If potted, please keep in pot & all, or just plant it in the ground by Halloween.

Blue-Eyed Grass, Dwarf Moody Blues

Sisyrinchium idahoense var. macounii 'Moody Blues'

AM/PM Sun 6 x 8 inches Attracts Pollinators

A North American native, vigorous grower, it thrives naturally along riverbanks, moist meadows, and woodlands. It blooms the first year with the largest blue-eyed flowers atop grassy, iris-like, green foliage, providing a haven for bees and beneficial insects with nutrients.

Blue-Eyed Grass, Dwarf Purple

Sisyrinchium angustifolium 'Lucerne'

AM/PM Sun 12 x 12 inches Kusamono

Purple flowers reward plants that are grown in loamy, sandy soil. Whether in a rockery or the flower border, it's easy to grow and admire. Divide every 2 years (if not annually) for healthy plants.

Burnet, Mini Purple

Acaena inermis 'Purpurea'

PM Sun 2 inch groundcover R^XR, Faery Garden

We cherish the contrast this hot and sunny groundcover offers with smoky, purple, fern-like leaves, tipped in red. Looks antique! It prefers a loose, well draining soil to provide a porous playground for underground runners. Mulch underneath with light colored stones to show it off.

Catsfoot - Pussytoes, Red

Antennaria dioica 'Rubra'

AM/PM Sun 2 x 6 inches Groundcover, Rock Garden

This tough plant, especially suited to hot sunny locations and poor, dry soil forms a very low, creeping mat of tiny, bright silvery-grey leaves. Short stems of fuzzy pink flowers appear in late spring. Perfect for the sunny rock gardens & in between stones. Divide in the spring. Mow off spent flowers.

Cinquefoil, Yellow Creeping

Potentilla neumanniana (Zone 5 - 8)

AM/PM Sun 2-4 x 24 inches Groundcover, Butterfly

THE spring day its bright yellow, 3/8" single flowers arrive on the right side of the walk to the greenhouse, it flies off the bench. It re-seeds readily to create one tough groundcover that competes well with any weed.

Columbine, Faerie 'Cameo Mix'

Aquilegia flabellata 'Cameo Mix'

AM/PM Sun 3 x 12 inches Groundcover, Butterfly

A bi-color rainbow of blue, pink, and white shades blanket this dwarf, compact plant in late spring to summer above shiny, gray green foliage.

Cotoneaster, Streibs Findling

Cotoneaster 'Streibs Findling'

PM Sun 2 x 3 foot

Mini Apple Tree, Bonsai, R^XR

This is a vigorous, evergreen shrub with a very low, spreading habit, and smaller leaves than the species. Its mildly glossy, green foliage is accompanied, in late spring, by tons of tiny white flowers. In the fall, the branches fill with red berries and by winter, the foliage turns purplish in the cold.

Cotoneaster, Thyme-leaf

PM Sun 3 x 3.5 foot Mini Apple Tree, Bonsai, R^XR

Small leaves ride this vigorous grower. It may reach 3 feet in several years but you can keep it compact as a mini apple tree, hedge or bonsai. Get connected with your local bonsai club for a wealth of knowledge and fun!

Delphinium

Delphinium grandiflorum 'Blauer Zwerg'

AM/PM Sun 15 x 15 inches Alpine, Containers

We source many of our unusual varieties from Germany, the land of great alpine plants & medicinal herbs. 'Blauer Zwerg' translates to "bluer dwarf," aptly describing this low growing, gentian blue, rare specimen. Blooms the first year from June to August.

Dianthus, Sternkissen

Dianthus gratianopolitanus 'Sternkissen'

AM/PM Sun 2 x 12 inches Groundcover

Deep pink stars rise above a fashionably blue green carpet, usually May through June. Fits in alpine, rock gardens and containers, attracts butterflies but not deer, is drought tolerant, and provides fragrant flowers atop evergreen foliage. Now that's multi-tasking!

Dianthus, Tiny Rubies

Dianthus gratianopolitanus 'Tiny Rubies'

AM/PM Sun 2 x 24 inches Groundcover, Rock Garden

Dianthus is a commonly grown alpine because of its easy culture. Bright ruby-pink, faery flowers smother the bluish, grassy foliage in the spring. Will eventually form a mat, two feet in diameter.

Edelweiss

Leontopodium alpinum

AM/PM Sun 2 x 6 inches Shrub, Alpine, Medicinal

Mark, having been born in the Bavarian region of Germany, and now growing alpine, is obligated to grow these legendary woolly, white tufts for which many a mountain climber died. They are rather short-lived perennials, but usually self-sow the next generation before they perish. Requires well drained soil and plenty of fresh air. Extremely limited quantities as it is a booger to germinate and grow in its early stages.

Elm, Mini Hokkaido

Ulmus parvifolia 'Hokkaido'

PM Sun 18 x 9 inches Bonsai, R^XR, Faery Garden

In 10 years, this tree will attain a maximum height of 18 to 24 inches and be covered in 1/8 inch leaves. In a couple of years, it will naturally shape into a bonsai tree. While it is so much easier to grow outdoors, if you try it as a houseplant, it is evergreen (IF it survives.)

Elm, Seiju

Ulmus parvifolia 'Seiju'

PM Sun 3 x 3 feet Bonsai, R^XR or Faery Garden

'Seiju' is a sport of 'Hokkaido' elm but with slightly larger leaves and a faster growth rate. Even so, it can be maintained as a mini tree from four inches tall to 20 feet, even after 40 years! Bark develops a pleasing corky character with age.

Erigeron-Fleabane, Tiny

Erigeron scopalinus

AM/PM Sun 1 x 4 inches Alpine, R^XR Garden, Mini Shrub

In 1978, this rock crevice dweller was discovered in Arizona. White (aster) daisies do the one inch ground-hugging mat. Its drought tolerance is perfect for a trough or in the cracks between side walks or in rock walls.

Euonymus, Mini Creeper

Euonymus fortunei 'Kewensis'

PM Sun 2 x 24 inches Walk-About, Vine, R^XR

Call it a "wintercreeper" between stepping stones, as it doesn't always go totally dormant during Ohio winters. Train it up a trellis or bring indoors (if you dare) for a tabletop garden, when its tiny dark green leaves turn scarlet each autumn.

EVERGREEN CONIFERS

\$18.99 and up 3 to 5 year old

Welcome to the kingdom of outdoor bonsai. With training, (you and the plants), you're on your way to an inexpensive specimen in two months! Create forests by growing several plants of the same variety together. It's true that odd numbers look balanced and most natural.

Dwarf Hinoki, Nana Gracilis

Chameocyparis obtusa 'Nana Gracilis'

AM/PM Sun 3 x 2 Feet Bonsai, R^XR Garden

'Nana Gracilis' Hinoki cypress is a dwarf, compact, slow-growing evergreen shrub with roots in Japan. The genus name comes from the Greek words "chamai" which means dwarf, and "kyparissos" which means cypress tree. Trial and error on this beginner size- not the \$50 ones.

Juniper, Miniature Garden

Juniperus communis 'Miniature'

AM/PM Sun 3 x 1-1/2 feet Bonsai, R^XR Garden

It is a well-mannered dwarf conifer, known for scoffing at wind, cold and reflected sun off snow. Gardeners line driveways or walkways with these silvery-needled, columnar-shaped evergreens adding casual to elegant to formal structures depending on pruning, number & configurations.

Dwarf Sawara Cypress, Variegated

Chameocyparis pisifera 'Compacta Variegata'

PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Rock & Faery Garden, Drought

You can see our 15 year old mother plant as you walk up to the greenhouse. This fluffy, mushroom-shaped evergreen with flecks and splashes of golden yellow variegation plays the perfect dwarf conifer in a rock garden.

MANY MORE EVERGREENS WILL BE OFFERED

We just aren't certain of the availability as I write in January.

Geranium, Tiny Pink

Geranium dalmaticum



PM Sun 3 x 6 inches Alpine, Groundcover

Petite in stature but it carries a big footprint for usefulness in the garden. It is perfectly suited in the rock garden, or ground cover beneath shrubs providing a finishing touch to areas often neglected for planting. Covered in pink flowers in spring and early summer, it shines at the front edge too.

HEN & CHICK COLLECTION \$5.99

Not your grandma's hens & chicks, these are ground-hugging rosettes with dew glistening soft bristles and/or "spider webs."

AM/PM Sun Groundcover, Strawberry Jars, Alpine

Hen & Chick, Coral Red

Sempervivum 'Coral Red' 4 x 6 inches

Welcome a bright red, drought tolerant groundcover that is incredibly hardy thanks to a strong root system.



Hen & Chick, Lager's Tiny

S. arachnoideum laggeri 1/2 x 4 inches

So rare you can't even Google this! Each one-half inch rosette only has a few "cobwebs" but makes the perfect cabbage in a mini vegetable patch.

Hen & Chick, Peggy

Sempervivum 'Peggy' 5 x 12 inches

Large, deep red rosettes mature to dusty purple. Like any hen & chick, flowering rosettes die, but are replaced by offsets from the mother plant.

Hen & Chick, Ruby Heart

Sempervivum 'Ruby Heart' 3 x 12 inches

Sharply pointed, silvery blue leaves, flush rosy red at the base of each rosette, and change color each season, intensifying in cold temperatures.

Heuchera, Mini Chiquita

Heuchera parishii 'Chiquita'

AM Sun+2 3 x 6 inches

Morning and filtered afternoon sun is the key to keeping this world's smallest Coral Bells alive. Rare and a tad picky, it hugs the ground and holds its spring to summer, pink and white washed flowers close to the foliage. Mature plants are no more than three inches high. Resembles micro rhubarb plants.



 **HARDY ICE PLANT \$5.99** 

Called ice plants, but there weren't any hardy varieties until the 1990's as their native home is South Africa. They thrive in dry climates but like a weekly soak during hot summers. Keep dry in the winter with a frost blanket to keep crowns dry, if snow usually lingers.

AM/PM Sun Groundcover, Containers, Butterfly, Bees Anti-Deer

Ice Plant, Hardy Desert Garnet

Delosperma x 'Jewel of Desert Garnet' PP #23,471
4 x 12 inches Erosion Control Groundcover

Witness a profusion of flowers, scarlet and lavender with white centers, covering its vigorous, mat-forming, bluish evergreen foliage. Up to the challenge of heat and drought conditions that Ohio serves up. Honestly, it is winter that might be tricky, as it needs super drained soil especially then, making it borderline hardy.



Ice Plant, Hardy Desert Peridot

Delosperma X 'Jewel of Desert Peridot' PP23,566
4 x 12 inches Banks, Slopes, Rock Walls

Hardy ice plants are gorgeous groundcovers for your driest, sunniest spots. This late spring into early fall bloomer shines in two-toned color. Sunny yellow blossoms with white centers cover the succulent green foliage.



Ice Plant, Hardy Desert Topaz

Delosperma X 'Jewel of Desert Topaz' PP23,492
4 x 14 inches Naturalized Areas, Baskets

Sparkling blooms of salmon-orange, with white centers & light pink in between, cover succulent carpets.



Ice Plant, Hardy Fire Wonder

Delosperma x 'Fire Wonder' PP25645
5 x 18 inches Hanging Baskets, Bees & Butterflies

This is the two-toned (smoldering orange-red petals surrounding yellow centers), taller model, and drought queen in the the "Fire Ice Plant" series.



Ice Plant, Hardy Fritos Yellow

Delosperma nubigenis
2 x 12 inches Ground Cover, Containers

June blooming yellow flowers smell like Fritos cornchips! *Delosperma nubigenum*, commonly called ice plant, is native to certain mountainous areas of South Africa, yet this mat-forming succulent has reportedly the best winter hardiness of the ice plants currently in cultivation.

Lady's Mantle Mini Alpine

Alchemilla faeroensis var. pumila 
AM Sun+2 3 x 3 inches Alpine, Container, Butterfly

Botanical name "pumilus" means little confirming. It will NOT take over your garden like its standard-sized cousins. I suggest you protect it in a container so the greenish-gold bloom clusters (June through September) aren't hidden by larger neighbors. Morning dew looks like crystals collected in the palm-shaped leaves, outlined in silvery-white margins. Truly magical!

Nothoscordum or Tiny Golden Garlic \$10.49

Nothoscordum montevidense
PM Sun 4 x 2 inches Potted Plant

Expect golden, mildly citrus-scented flowers no taller than four inches, spring through fall. Not always winter hardy in northern Ohio, but if you bring your pot into a protected area, this plant will resurrect next spring.

In the onion family, BUT NOT GARLIC (that is merely its common name), its tiny bulbs are easy to divide and share with other containers and your friends.



 **SEDUMS \$5.99** 

Sedums are work horses in hot, dry environments, asking for minimal care. They're popular in troughs, strawberry jars, xerophytic landscapes, on green roofs and with the butterflies.

AM/PM Sun Porous Soil Minimal Watering

Sedum, (Mini) Angelina

Sedum rupestre 'Mini Angelina'
2 x 12 inches Erosion Groundcover, Hanging Basket

Brilliant chartreuse-yellow, needle-like foliage and vibrant yellow flowers form a super short, quick groundcover over dry slopes and in between taller flowers. Like other sedums, it bronzes (given plenty of sun) by fall.



Sedum, Corsican

Sedum requienii
½ x 5 inches Alpine Rock Garden, Groundcover

When growing a groundcover in full sun between flagstones, you need a tough perennial that puts up with some foot traffic like this one. There's an ongoing debate whether it is botanically a sedum, as it doesn't look like one. It's softer & more flexible than typical sedums. However, there is no doubt this shiny green leaved ground hugger will survive brutal winters.

Sedum, Frosted Blue

Sedum hispanicum minus 'Pink Form'
2 x 12 inches Groundcover, Rock, Faery Garden

Think of a mini blue spruce forest, frosted in pink, viewed from 100 feet above. This is one of the most beautiful and unusual mini sedums with pink-tipped, blue leaves. Pink, nearly white, flowers dottle above in early summer.



Sedum, Irish Eyes

Sedum middendorffianum var. diffusum
2 x 12 inches Groundcover, Rock Garden, Jar Gem

St. Patty's Day meets Christmas! Irish green rosettes with red centers form thick blankets and yellow flowers in the summer, then blush and intensify to a "poinsettia red," overall, by winter.



Sedum, Love's Triangle

Sedum anglicum 'Love's Triangle'
1 x 12+inches Groundcover, R^XR^R

Pinkish-white flowers entertain soft, powder blue, pea-sized foliage in spring. To ensure next year's crop, overwinter in a sunny window. Can root a 2" cutting too.

Sedum, Tricolor Carpet

Sedum spurium 'Tricolor'
2 x 12 inches Groundcover, R^XR^R, Strawberry Jar Gem

Three colors for 3 seasons. White, pink, and green tiny rosettes bear pink, star-shaped June flowers. Summer sun adds a plum wash over the foliage by fall. Tough groundcover that puts up with neglect as lo it is placed in well-draining, preferably gravelly soil.

Sedum, What a Doozie

Sedum X 'What a Doozie' PPAF
5 x 14 inches Rock Garden, Mixed Container

Brilliant variegated leaves (that don't revert back to green) form a low, spreading groundcover. Plants gain attractive blush pink and creamy pink flowers in the Fall- a welcome late season treat for the bees.



Solidago, Tiny Goldenrod

Solidago coulteri 
AM/PM Sun 2 x 8 inche Mini Shrub, Faery, Butterfly

Here's a mini version of North America's favorite scapegoat for hayfever. But at only 2-3" tall, the cute, golden-yellow flowers are really not enough "to sneeze at." Why not create a miniature, butterfly attracting meadow?

Stachys, Little Lamb

Stachys byzantina 'Little Lamb' PPAF 
PM Sun 3 x 12 inches Rock Garden, Deer Proof 

Silver velvety, suede-like leaves, about the size of a dime form a bed for lilac-plum flower spikes, from May to July. Tolerates dry, shallow and rocky soil, as well as air pollution and even the toxic roots of black walnut trees. Does not like humidity so a light-colored mulch around them is wise.

Stachys, Dwarf Betony

Stachy officinalis 'Nana' 
AM/PM Sun 6 x 9 inches Rock Gardens, Troughs

Instead of fuzzy gray lamb's ear leaves, this lovely little summer bloomer exhibits glossy, dark green, zig-zag edged leaves and tubular purple flowers. Plants form a nice clump in the garden and can be divided to keep smaller.

 **THRIFT \$5.99** 

In a world of round leaves, thrifts stand out! Perky globes announce spring, and linger into summer. They thrive in porous soil.

AM/PM Sun Dry Soil Cottage Garden, Butterfly

Thrift, Faery

Armeria caespitosa (juniperifolia)
2 x 12 inches Faery Shrub

"Cockroach hardy" alpine with rose clusters of flowers in early spring, join perky, grassy, ever-green tufts. All thrifts work and contrast well with sedums.



Thrift, Little Penny

Armeria X 'Little Penny'
1-1/2 x 3 inches Alpine Groundcover, R^XR^R, Faery Garden

Take "Faery Thrift," reduce by 50%, and you have it! Flowers aren't even tall enough for any kind of stem, rather they just perch on its foliage. In our photos, we usually add a quarter to show relative size, but a dime suffices.

Thrift, Mini Red-leaf

Armeria maritima 'Rubrifolia'
4 x 8 inches Alpine Shrub, R^XR^R Filler, Faery Garden

Blooms non-stop during cooler weather. I like the reddish pink, round flower clusters that bob above, but I adore the dark, reddish purple blades, early summer, for their contrast in the garden or container. Our son, long ago, suggested faeries use these flowers as balloons in a parade.

Thrift, Red Faery

Armeria caespitosa 'Bevan's'
2 x 8 inches Mini Grass, R^XR^R Filler, Faery Garden

"Red Fairy" is honestly more of a dark pink rather than red, but trust me, the flowers are vivid. Since this and other thrifts bloom the entire spring, pick neighbors from our abundance of summer bloomers.

Thrift, Variegated

Armeria x 'Nifty Thrifty'
2 x 12 inches Mini Grass or shrub, R^XR^R

Blades are gold with a green stripe down the center. Even in cooler springs, you can't miss the dark pink flowers by June. After that, you'll get flowers randomly until Labor Day. Plays a tall, mounded grass in a mini world.



 **THYMES, CREEPING** 

These are the elite "Walk-Abouts," this is, extremely low spreaders that tolerate a fair amount of foot traffic releasing scent with each step. **AM/PM Sun Dry Soil Bonsai Lawn, Butterfly, Bees**

Thyme, Elfin

Thymus praeceox ssp. articus cv. **\$5.99**

1 x 24 inches "Walk-About," Bonsai, Faery Garden

Pink flowers adorn this truly diminutive groundcover in summer. We use it as a moss substitute in bonsais. It is essential to any hypertufa container or rock garden. Spreading slowly, eventually reaching a dizzying height of one inch, it mounds as though there were elf homes pushing up from underneath the thyme.

Thyme, Red Mother-of-Thyme \$4.99

Thymus pulegioides "Walk-About," Erosion Control Spreader

1 x 24 inches

With gusto, this one hugs the ground and moves briskly to fill an herb lawn, pathway or rock garden niche with glossy green leaves- a delight to walk over. Intense magenta spring flowers are not to be missed.

Thyme, White Moss \$4.99

Thymus praeceox ssp. arcticus 'White Moss' "Walk-About," Ornamental, Rock Garden

1/2 x 24 inches

Big hit here when these pure white flowers emerge among bright green foliage. Suitable for rock gardens and as a "Walk About" as it's one of the lowest and flattest thymes we offer. Usually sells out early in the spring.

Valerian, Miniature

Valeriana supina 
PM Sun 2 x 4 inches Faery Rock Gardens 

This is the mini "faery" cousin to the calming medicinal. It multiplies quickly, with aromatic, rounded foliage and pink fragrant flowers on top of stems like a bouquet-on-a-stick. Site in well-drained soil, in a sunny location, to attract butterflies and bore the deer.

Veronica, Tiny Blue \$6.99

Veronica altensis 

AM/PM Sun 1 x 24 inches Alpine, R^XR^R Spiller

Handles foot traffic. From rock gardens to in between patio flagstones, it grows slowly but steadily even under drought situations thanks to its rugged roots in the mountains of Turkey. Tiny, dark green leaves mimic creeping thyme, but the disguise is foiled when hundreds of small, azure blue flowers erupt, mid spring. Humble in the pot but tough-as-nails evergreen groundcover, once established.

Woodruff, Tiny Sicilian \$6.99

Asperula sintenisii 
AM Sun+2 2 x 4 inches Rock Gardens

Pink stars cover hand-sized, gray-green, pointy (but not painful) cushions in June and July. Perfect for cottage, gravel or container gardens. Native to Turkey, it is most at home in porous soils, surrounded by rocks. Drier soils encourages prolific blooming.

Yarrow, Utah Mini

Achillea sp. ex Utah 
AM/PM Sun 2 x 12 inches Mini Shrub/Tall Groundcover

Buttercup yellow flowers rise just high enough over the ferny leaves. Spreads slowly along mini railroad tracks or in rock gardens, contrasting nicely with gray stones.

Hardy Shade Miniatures & Companions

Like HARDY SUN MINIATURES, the plants in this section prefer the outdoors 365 days a year, and do best in the shade. Most enjoy AM Sun with PM SHADE, while many like light, from sunrise to 2:00 (AM Sun+2). Just a few plants thrive in full shade, but that's all marked by each entry. IN GENERAL: THE MORE SUN YOU GIVE A PLANT, THE MORE WATER IT REQUIRES. (We're talking a good soak during the heat of the summer.)

Ajuga, Chocolate Chip

Ajuga reptans 'Chocolate Chip'

AM Sun+2 2 x 6 inches Groundcover, Topiary, Bonsai

Ajuga's trademark as a tough and hardy shade plant remains intact in these slightly smaller versions. Clumps of foliage look as if a watercolor artist applied a plum wash sporadically over otherwise dark green foliage.



Ajuga, Multicolor

Ajuga reptans 'Multicolor'

AM Sun+2 1 x 6 inches Groundcover, RXXR Garden, Bonsai

Cream, pink, light green, plum, and shades in between- the leaves can't seem to make up their minds. What is certain is that this plant does best in the cool shade.




Bellium or Mini Daisy

Bellium bellidioides (a.k.a. minuta)

AM Sun+2 2 x 8 inches

Though it hails from the toasty Mediterranean region, this white flowering daisy is perfectly hardy to our winters. Rosettes of dark green, spoon-shaped leaves cradle 4 inch stalks of delicate daisies in expanding, everblooming mounds. At the base of a bonsai as an accent plant, it is unbelievably charming.

Shade or Sun 1 x 6 inches RXXR Thriller

Does anything stop this groundcover or its endless parade of tiny pink tulips all summer? We have watched this 2" carpet grow in the dry shade of our railroad garden and in full sun in our

stock fields. It passed every test. It's not aggressive but I suspect the faeries are behind its much appreciated self seeding. It is comfortably elegant- a blue jeans to ball gown kind of plant.

THE RIGHT PLANT FOR THE RIGHT PLACE:

- In ground/garden or container?
 - if in ground, do you have well draining soil?
 - is container at least 4 inches deep & 12 inches wide?
- Sunny or shady location?
 - if spot gets sun in the PM, choose sun plants.
 - if spot gets AM sun **only**, choose shade plants.
- Year round outdoors?
 - if in a PM sun spot, choose HARDY SUN MINIATURES.
 - if in a PM shady spot, choose HARDY SHADE MINIS.
- OR Indoors for the winter?
 - if by a south or west window, choose TROPICAL SUN.
 - if by an east or north window, choose TROPICAL SHADE. (PM Sun = noon to at least 6 pm)

BONSAI ACCENT PLANTS: support the specimen

Bonsai isn't just the specimen. Supporting actors called accent plants are grown at the base OR in a small pot that is displayed next to the star. Accent plants in this hardy shade collection include:

- flowers (ajuga, bellium, carpet tulip, coral bells, kenilworth ivy, star creeper)
- lawn or groundcovers (faery fern, true ferns, gotu kola, corsican mint)
- grasses (mondo, chocolate sedge, sweet flag, tiny sweet woodruff)
- plus bamboo, mosses, even some mushrooms, and many more.

Coral Bells, Chiquita

Heuchera parishii 'Chiquita'

Faery Garden,

We've got the world's smallest coral bells! Tiny, bell-shaped flowers, white petals with pink calyxes (outermost whorl around the base of each flower) coupled with ground hugging foliage, looks best grown in masses.

FAERY FERNS, HARDY

If you're a botanist, you probably already know these are NOT true ferns. In our opinion, it is easier for a child to wrap their minds around "Faery Fern" rather than *Leptinella*, *Cotula*, or whatever the botanists settle for its genus. PM SHADE Shade Lawn, Between Stones, RXXR Garden, Bonsai

Faery Fern, Brass Buttons

Leptinella (Cotula) squalida

PM Shade 2 x 18 inches

Slightly felted, green, fern-like leaves creep just above the soil to form a thick carpet of curious yellow "Brass Button" blooms. Works as a rugged groundcover or lawn between stepping stones, in the shade.



Faery Fern, Platt's Black

Leptinella (Cotula) x 'Platt's Black'

PM Shade 1 x 15 inches

Add a bit of morning sun and these inch long leaves turn jet black! In a little more shade, they grow bicolored green with black tips. Grow over crushed white stone for best effect. Yellow buttons form each spring!



Faery Money, Golden

Lysimachia japonica minutissima

Sun or Shade 1 x 12 inches

This is among the best hardy RXXR ground cover as it spreads, but won't take over the tracks. Bonsai artists use it and many other low growers as a base plant. Bright yellow flowers (May and June) pop up between stepping stones, troughs & faery gardens.



Mark invited his buddies over to transform scrubby nursery shrubs into "half-way bonsai." "It's up to the owner to add their touches," says Paul.



Within 5 hours, they transformed 60 evergreens. Here's how:

1. Study the bonsai to determine style- cascading or upright.
2. Trim off the top of the root ball to locate the "Nabari." You can see where the main trunk meets the soil line, to the left of Paul's hand.
3. Trim off dead & lower branches.
4. Clear away branches, roughly as much as you trim the root ball.
5. Water it in deeply and put the bonsai in filtered shade for a week to lessen the "shock."

TRUE FERNS \$5.99

Ferns are popular with shade gardeners because they offer a lush, tropical look, and are well behaved. Although they are not true miniatures, these are the smallest out there.

PM Shade Woodland, Zen, Cottage and Rain Gardens



Fern, Harts Tongue

Asplenium scolopendrium

1 x 1 foot Bonsai accent, Cool Shade

Hart's tongue is an ancient-woodland-indicator plant. If you spot it while you're out exploring, it could be a sign you're standing in a rare and special habitat. Best part is when these broad fronds unfurl.



Fern, Korean Rock

Polystichum tsussimense

1 x 1 foot Bonsai accent, Dry Shade

Recipient of the prestigious "Award of Garden Merit" of the Royal Horticultural Society for its small space size; leathery, glossy blue-green fronds; and lush, fresh appearance all season. A popular choice for boutonnières to shaded rock gardens, though it enjoys morning sun.



Fern, Lady Fern Victoria

Athyrium filix-femina 'Victoriae'

18 x 24 inches Cottage Gardens, Along Stream or Ponds

As far as frond architecture goes, this is Queen. This superb selection has amazingly green fronds whose pinnae (leaflets) crisscross to form x's. Trust me- it's cool and quite unique. This particular variety was discovered in Scotland in 1861 in the midst of the feverish fern collecting Victorian era.

Fern, Lady In Red

Athyrium filix-femina 'Lady in Red'

2 x 2 feet Native, Woodland Garden, Anti-Rabbit too

Vibrant burgundy color runs through the veins creating a striking contrast with fine-textured, lacy green fronds on this New England native. Avoid fertilizing with nitrogen to obtain the red stem color by its second year. Plant with bold-leaved plants in the shade or woodland garden like hosta.

Fern, Maidenhair, Himalayan

Adiantum venustum

7 x 24 inches Faery Garden, Houseplant

Native to the foothills of the Himalayas, it forms a thick, slow-spreading groundcover with blue-green, teardrop-shaped leaflets on black stems. Fronds are semi-evergreen. They work great in floral arrangements and performs the best in cooler areas.



Fern, Regal Red

Athyrium niponicum var. pictum

18 x 24 inches Zen/Asian, Erosion Control

You might know it better as "Japanese Painted Fern." Striking violet-red fronds are contrasted by bright silver edges, giving a tapestry effect. Use these lovely fronds in fresh cut bouquets for long lasting color and soft texture.



Gotu Kola, New Zealand Mini

Hydrocotyle nova zealandiae

AM Sun+2 1/2 x 12 inches Groundcover, Water Garden, Edible

Although it may have similar memory enhancing qualities as our variegated form listed with the culinary herbs, it landed in the miniature section because it is known more as a water and shade loving plant. Still, its green scalloped, 1/4" leaves are tasty.



MINIATURE HOSTAS

Miniature "Hostas" are the sweet, heart-leaved stars of the shade. You can grow them year after year if you tuck them in porous soil that is watered regularly by the heavens or a hose. Mark strongly believes these mini hostas should be divided every 1 to 2 years (preferably in August, to have time to root before winter.) Avoiding overcrowding not only looks better, prevents premature death and makes a bigger impact from a distance. Miniature hostas are often seen better in a container and it keeps them out of a slug's reach. Overwinter in the ground by September. **AM Sun+2 Tolerates black walnut roots Attracts butterflies, hummingbirds, slugs & deer Rock walls, woodlands, bonsai, RXR, faery gardens**

Hosta, Baby Bunting \$6.99

5 x 16 inches
Cupped blue-green two-toned leaves almost perfectly round, having some nice corrugation. They ripen later in the season, and even get a pleasing rough texture with age. Pale lavender flowers pop in late June.

Hosta, Baby Kim \$10.49

4 x 10 inches
Did you know hostas are in the Lily family? A giveaway are the lily-like, purple scapes (leafless flower stalks) hovering two to 3 times taller than the hosta mounds. Baby Kim's scapes appear in July over shiny green foliage.

Hosta, 'Cameo' \$10.49

4 x 8 inches
Hostas appreciate a special place and some TLC. Simply grow in foot high troughs, or in raised beds that are 6" higher than the surrounding turf. Morning sun brings out the creamy variegation and encourages light purple flowers by July.

Hosta, Collector's Choice \$6.99

2 x 12 inches
We mean miniature! Tiny, pointed leaves form 2 maybe 3" mounds. Expect lavender flowers in midsummer. The American Hosta society dictates the maximum size for a miniature hosta and this one easily qualifies.

Hosta, Cracker Crumb \$10.49

3 x 19 inches
You are allowed to have crackers in bed(s)! Gold centers illuminate each 3 inch leaf, outlined in green. Lavender flowers, 13" tall, appear in July. Add Faery Ferns, Mondo Grass or Chocolate Sedge and Spikemoss for fun.

Hosta Cookie Crumbs \$6.99

5 x 16 inches
Two inch, tear-drop-shaped, mid-green leaves are lined with white margins that usually age gold. Always looks neat in a bowl or tough.



Hosta, Curly Fries \$10.49

6 x 16 inches
Form an arching, wiggly clump of extremely rippled, narrow leaves. Its chartreuse foliage is brightest in morning sun only. Mature plants will develop red speckled stalks. Lavender flowers top the clump in midsummer.

Hosta, Ground Sulfur \$10.49

6 x 9 inches
Because it is fast growing, this small Hosta with pointed sulphur-yellow leaves forms a thick mat smothering most weeds.



Hosta, Japan Boy \$6.99

5 x 10 inches
Originated in Japan but was developed by Fritz Köhlein of Germany, it has narrow, lance-shaped (pointed) leaves of green and is slow a grower.

Hosta, Lakeside Downsized \$6.99

4 x 9 inches
Narrow, tapering, rippled, greenish-yellow leaves form fast growing, untidy (in a good way) mounds. These hostas, in photos, appear to be moving- like n... make, no kidding!

Hosta, Mini Skirt \$10.49

5 x 8 inches
Its thick mounds of ruffly, blue-green leaves with wide, creamy margins lighten in the heat of the summer. Cute flowers are hover just above the foliage in a pale shade of lavender in June and July.



Hosta, Munchkin Fire \$10.49

5 x 12 inches
This vigorous neon yellow miniature hosta is the perfect size for troughs & fairy gardens. Short and narrow leaves hold their bright yellow color all season long. By midsummer, lavender flowers pop above petite mounds.



Hosta x 'Pandora's Box' \$10.49

8 x 19 inches
This miniature selection has white-striped, wide leaves with a streaky, green margin. A lighter green area appears in the leaf where the white and green meet, (aka "medio variegated"). Light purple scapes arrive in July. Suitable for planting in mixed containers or tubs. Hosta tip: All go totally dormant in the fall. Spent foliage should be removed before spring.

Hosta, School Mouse \$10.49

8 x 12 inches
See the clearly defined yellow margin outlining thick, wavy leaves? Color holds throughout the season. Proportionately sized scapes carry lavender flowers in July, if not June too.



"Sluggo" is organic control for slugs & snails, containing iron phosphate, a fertilizer. "Sluggo" can safely be used around pets and wildlife.

Hosta, Sun Mouse \$10.49

6 x 12 inches
Enjoy brilliant yellow leaves from their arrival to fall, just before they go dormant. Brighten up hosta troughs, shade gardens, and vertical walls. Hostas even grow well in the city, tolerating polluted air!



Hosta, Sunlight Child \$10.49

5 x 12 inches
Bright yellow, lance-shaped leaves have a slightly wavy edge, resembling that 70s "Seersucker" fabric. Leaf stems are speckled with a reddish-purple cinnamon pattern. Altogether it forms a miniature mound of yellow foliage good for a container or rock garden. Lavender flowers appear in mid-summer and contrast nicely with the yellow foliage.

Hosta, Shiny Tot \$6.99

4 x 12 inches
Over the years, 'Shiny Tot' has become a premier, dwarf-sized hosta. In August, lavender flowers watch over these thick, glossy, dark green mounds, making it a natural bonsai accent plant and trough favorite.

Hosta, Tears of Joy \$6.99

4 x 13 inches
This offspring of "Tiny Tears" has folded, medium-green, sword-shaped leaves with white variegation. Lavender flowers in mid-summer, and vigorous growth. Its ruffled appearance is excellent for use in troughs.

This ivy is determined to stay small no matter how much you fertilize. Duck foot-shaped, dark green leaves grow evenly on serpentine stems.



Ivy, Anita

Hedera helix 'Anita'
2 x 12 inches RXR, Grape Vine
Precious micro-maple leaf foliage makes a lush filler to any planting. "Ivy" represents fidelity so it is the appropriate herb to decorate a wedding cake. Ranks #1 most popular "miniature grapevine" for garden railroaders.

Ivy, Feen Finger

Hedera helix 'Feen Finger'
2 x 12 inches RXR, Baskets, Topiary, Terrarium
"Feen Finger" (in German means "Faery Finger"- really!) is wonderfully compact with tiny long thin "lobes" per leaf, which truly look like tiny hands!

Ivy, Henrietta

Hedera helix 'Henrietta'
2 x 12 inches Topiary Form, RXR Grape Vine
I've yet to see a smaller more heavily variegated ivy than "Henrietta." Great as a houseplant and an easy miniature topiary standard. Since ivy stands for friendship, it's a terrific plant to share.




Ivy, Mini Easter

Hedera helix 'Mini Easter'
2 x 12 inches Houseplant, Faery Garden
Choose this bright cream, variegated ivy to create a proper English garden. Imagine a hedge of miniature boxwood, arborvitae, this ivy and a foot high English Cottage.

Ivy, Peter Pan

Hedera helix 'Peter Pan'
2 x 12 inches RXR Grapevine Trellis, Topiary
Peter Pan is Mark's choice for grapevines in a railroad garden scene as he thinks its foliage looks most like grape leaves, at a distance. He makes a tiny fence with bamboo stakes and uses #20 florist wire to attach the ivy as it grows.



Kenilworth Ivy, Mini
Cymbalaria aequitriloba
AM Sun+2 1 x 8 inches
"Walk-About"
...pale pink, mini...
...green foliage. Don't be fooled by its delicate appearance- it's a tough, ground-hugging, polite spreader. The more sun it gets, the more water it wants.

JAPANESE MAPLE \$22.99

Acer palmatum
These are our own root (not grafted) varieties, destined for bonsai (no scar). All are very hardy in the garden IF they receive shade from the hot afternoon sun.



Butterfly

Grows into an 8 to 10 foot tree with white, pink and green leaves each spring.



Hubbs Red Willow

Super fine red leaves adorn this 10 to 12 foot tree, that turn even more red in the fall.

Ivy Leaf Golden Veil

Delicate green, fingered leaves turn brilliant golden yellow and orange as autumn leaves turn. This 5 to 15 foot tree was born at Ohio's Klyn Nursery.

Oridono Nishiki

Pink variegated leaves turn gold, then red in the fall on this 10 to 13' tree.

Orange Dream

Gold leaves outlined in maroon turn burnt orange in fall on 10 to 12' trees.

Seiryu

Races to 20' tall with red-tipped green leaves turning purple to red in fall.

Viridis/ Green Thread Leaf

Green to gold to orange leaves adorn this 5 x 5 foot semi-weeping variety.

Planted en masse, mondo grasses take on an undulating appearance and, with a light drizzle or dew, the effect is calming and magical. Thus, it has achieved icon status in Eastern, Zen, and bonsai gardens.



Mondo Grass, White Sparkler \$5.99

Ophiopogon chingii 'Sparkler'

Am Sun+2 2 x 5 inches

Mini Grass or Shrub, Bonsai

This delicate, fine leaved "Mondo Grass," with pure white flower spikes throughout the summer, is utilized as a miniature "Pampas Grass" in railroad and faery gardens. Linear blades are a welcome contrast to round leaves.



Polygonatum, Dwarf Solomon's Seal \$10.49

Polygonatum humile 'Fred Case form'

PM Shade 6 x 24 inches Miniature Woodland

Make an authentic woodland scene with "Dwarf Solomon's Seal," complete with pleated, deep green leaves and dangling white flowers. Bluish-black, inedible fruit follows. Great for shady rock gardens and a wide variety of soils. Fred Case, for whom this plant was named, was a famous biology teacher & breeder, and also our Shelley Hayes' high school teacher.

PRIMROSE \$5.99

Announce spring with a rainbow of vibrant colors from this super hardy miniature. More varieties than what's listed may be offered.

Primrose, Clusiana

Primula clusiana

AM Sun+2 5 x 6 inches Alpine Gardens, Troughs

Unless you are a collector or avid alpine gardener, you might not believe this is a primrose. Naturally found in limestone crevices, growing in limestone certainly explains the rosette habit, the deep green leaves and alkaline soil preference. In the garden in troughs, pots or raised beds that can imitate its natural habitat. Try adding limestone to the soil. Mid-spring to early summer, short stems carry clusters of purplish red flowers with a white eye, and deeply notched petals.

Primrose, Gold Lace

Primula Elatior-Hybr. 'Gold Lace'

AM Sun+2 8 x 12 inches Cottage Garden, Underplanting

They begin as rosettes of long oval, green leaves, sometimes tinged red. Beginning mid-spring, a parade of flat, red-brown flowers adorned with golden centers and intricately edged in shimmering gold arrive. Plant with the daffodils, under roses, for a classic cottage garden combination.



Primrose, Wanda

Primula x juliae 'Wanda'

AM Sun+2 3 x 12 inches

Harbinger of Spring!

This is among the first flowers of spring, exploding with fuchsia fury, blooming with daffodils their entire season! Considered one of the toughest, hardiest primroses as tested by our wind swept fields. No large shady areas? Plant it on the north side of any shrub. Divide clumps annually after flowers finish.

Anything but afternoon sun. Beyond fuchsia, we will offer shades of blue, lilac, raspberry, velvet and a mix of all of the above.



Saxifrage, Strawberry

Saxifraga stolonifera 'Harvest Moon'

PM Shade 2 x 24 inches Woodland Shade

Woodland gardens can use a little brightening. The newest growth is bright green, golden leaves with reddish undersides and stems. As the temperatures, it sends out arching threads which land on the soil and immediately form another identical plant like a strawberry.

Sedge, Mini Chocolate-leaf

Carex buchmannii

AM Sun+2 2 x 6 inches RXR

Looking for shade-loving, tiny tufts of grass for a western railroad garden? All aboard! Milk chocolate to olive green leaves turn dark chocolate in sunnier spots. Spreads VERY slowly, but, digging up and dividing speeds up the process.



STAR CREEPERS \$5.99

These are literally the stars of the shade when seeking plants for in-between stepping stones, landscape groundcover, or lawns.

Star Creeper, Alpine White

Pratia puberula 'Alba'

AM Sun+2 2 x 18 inches Groundcover

Hardy, flowering groundcovers in the shade are quite popular. This plant blooms white well into the fall when pampered with normal to moist soil and shade. Whether for a fanciful faery garden, or creeping between plants or stepping stones, star creepers thrive in loose, organic, rotted bark soil.



Star Creeper, Baby Blue

Pratia pendunculata (Laurentia)

AM Sun+2 2 x 18 inches Faery Lawn

Why not try this quick spreading, shade to sun groundcover? Sweet, baby-blue, star-shaped flowers (from late May until September) resemble tiny inverted umbrellas protecting a dark green carpet. These take off once established.

Sweet Flag, Japanese Mini Gold

Acorus gramineus 'Oborozuki'

3 x 9 inches Terrarium, Miniature Grass

This dwarf grass grows to only 4" tall. Sweet Flags are a rare exception of staying within cultural groups. Though listed here in hardy shade, they can come indoors to play with tropical shade plants in a terrarium. Add a few black stones to create a striking display with these golden tufts.



Woodruff, Tiny Sweet

Asperula suavis

P. Sun - P. Shade 6 x 12 inches

Bees, RXR Garden

It's hard to find much information on this RARE Black Sea native. We know it as a well-behaved, clumping groundcover with endless dividing opportunities (make more clumps!) with lovely whorls of white flowers most of the warm season.

Tropical Shade Miniatures

Great for terrariums or winter landscapes, these versatile botanical wonders cheer up your winter windowsill and summer shaded gardens. Indoors, they thrive by a semi-bright window; just not in direct sun. Wait until soil is slightly but not bone dry, and then soak until water seeps out the bottom of the pot. By May, move them to an outdoor shaded garden or patio. Whether in the ground with your hosta collection or in mixed planters, be sure to avoid harsh afternoon sun. **Most are AM Sun+2** meaning outdoors, they prefer sunrise to 2 pm sun to color up!

African Violet, Humpty Doo Mini

Saintpaulia 'Rob's Humpty Doo'

AM Sun+2 1-1/2 x 3 inches Terrariums, Shade Gardens

Like any violet, use room temperature water to avoid permanent spotting on the leaves. The sweetest, non-stop, blue and white flowers hold court over rosettes, which enjoy frequent dividing.



Alternanthera, Gold Threads

Alternanthera ficoidea 'Aurea Nana'

AM Sun+2 8 x 8 inches

Terrariums, RXR Gardens, Faery Bush

Popular in public gardens because of their colorful show in mass, and tolerance of pruning shears. Allow it to be a golden tropical tree, or trim top for a bushy annual specimen in the faery or railroad landscape.

Alternanthera, Red Threads

Alternanthera ficoidea 'Red'

AM Sun+2 10 x 10 inches Terrariums, Shade RXR Gardens

Bright red foliage comes in a golden miniature. Picture a jungle tabletop garden with "Red Threads" and "Golden Baby's Tears," or add a begonia for a Hawaiian theme.


Alternanthera, Snow Queen

PM Shade 1 x 12 inches Terrarium

This is a bright gold version of the popular houseplant. Micro leaves unite to form a glowing groundcover for railroad gardeners, and a lawn in mini landscapes. By summer's end, dig up these golden jewels, or they will die!



MINIATURE BEGONIAS

Divide & share when the leaves or plants are on the verge of getting too large. Indoors, allow to dry out in between waterings and nourish with organic fertilizer monthly. Many are South African natives, however, they perish in hot sun so site in indirect light indoors or a spot that is morning sun only outside. Use this guide for begonias:

Begonia, Spotted Butterfly

Begonia dregei 'Glasgow'

12 x 12 inches Butterfly

Attractive to butterflies, bees and bonsai artists who are drawn to the extra spotted foliage, the swollen base and plentiful white flowers. Begonias are beginner plants, ready to inspire new gardeners.



Begonia, Fuchsia Red

Begonia fuchsioides 'Rubra'

16 x 12 inches Tree, Bees, Butterflies

Glossy is what begonias are made of. This red blooming beauty is to be outdone, sumptuous flowers dangle like heavy earrings.

Begonia, Fuchsia Tiny

Begonia foliosa var. putzevskiana

9 x 9 inches Mini Tree, Bonsai

This world's smallest leaved begonia "dressed in fuchsia's clothing" will eventually grow up in 5 to 10 years. Glossy green foliage sits well with non-stop, rose colored flowers for a blooming bonsai.



Begonia, Mini Maple Leaf \$6.99

Begonia partita

8 x 18 inches Flowering Tree

The ability to grow under dry conditions makes this an ideal choice for indoors. An excellent subject for bonsai, this South African species forms a swollen base (caudex) and small sharply pointed, Japanese Maple-like leaves. Delicate white flowers form freely throughout the warm season.




Begonia, Rhinestone Jeans

Begonia 'Rhinestone Jeans'

4 x 6 inches Mini Shrub, Houseplant

Our smallest "Rex Begonia" shows off lime green leaves with maroon red mottling, and flirty, thick "eyelash" leaf margins. Blooms with clusters of simple, two petal, white flowers IF happy, that is, moist but not wet.



Breynia, Mini Snowbush \$6.99

Breynia nivosa 'Roseopicta Nana'

AM Sun+2 6 x 12 inches Bonsai

"Even Karen couldn't kill this one in the house," or so says Mark. Unusually bright white, rose, and green mottled leaves for a plant tolerant of LOW light and warm houses. Consider it a beginner bonsai plant.



Callisia, Pink Panther

Callisia repens 'Pink Panther'

AM Sun+2 4 x 6 inches Hanging Baskets

An updated wandering jew comes to mind with this creeping, basket-loving succulent. Waxy, green-striped leaves washed in cream and pink with burgundy undersides reign with a side show of tiny, June white flowers.



Cissus, Mini Grape Vine

Cissus striata

AM Sun +2 24 inch trailing Houseplant, Basket

Grows so fast you'd swear you can SEE its vines lengthen, yet the relatively tiny grape-leaf-like leaves land it in this miniature shade section. Bounces back from the occasional watering blunder. EASY!



Confetti Fern, Variegated

Pilea microphylla 'Variegata'

AM Sun+2 4 x 4 inches
Tree or Shrub, Terrariums, Houseplant
From low light to full sun, these white, pink and green leaves look like the plant is perpetually flowering. Eventually grows into a vase shaped tree.



Dragon's Tongue or Waffle Plant

Hemigraphis repanda

AM Sun+2 5 x 5 inches Terrarium, Faery, Houseplants
Add texture to terrariums with the wiggly-edged purple leaves of this easy going houseplant. Grassy foliage is relatively low growing so it's ideal in dish gardens, terrariums, and the underplanting of larger houseplants. Ignite a child's green thumb with this beloved faery plant.

Faery Fern, Tiny Tim

Leptinella gruveri

AM Sun+2 1/4 x 4 inches Terrarium, Faery Lawn, R^{XR}
If a tiny leaved thick carpet isn't impressive enough, each bright green leaf has a frilly edge (although you just about need a magnifying glass to see it.) Any of the faery ferns are "designed" for railroad gardens or a child's mini landscape adorned with a set of dinosaurs. Throw in a haworthia and a "Ficus, Tiny Oak Leaf" and you have an underwater scene in a terrarium.

Fern, World's Smallest Boston

Nephrolepis 'Mini Russells'

PM Shade 3 x 3 inches R^{XR} Shrub, Faery Garden
Botanically it is a true "Boston Fern" however, the fronds normally grow no more than 2 inches long. Holy Cow! Works well in a tropical shade miniature garden setting providing a fresh green shrub element. The trick is "even moisture"- not too dry, not too wet and keep it in indirect light.

Ficus appreciate evenly moist soil. Avoid extremely wet or overly dry conditions. Move indoors when temps dip into the 50's. Don't panic if your ficus loses some leaves after a move in or outside.

AM Sun+2 Bright Indoors/Shade Outside Bonsai, Faery Gardens

Ficus, Burt Davy Bonsai

Ficus burti davyi nana

12 x 12 inches Tropical Bonsai Specimen
This is the bonsai choice because the tiny leaves can be reduced to less than 1/4 inch, grown in brighter light indoors. In addition, this ficus is endowed with an abundance of branches for shaping and even produces small, (bird) edible, green figs, if the flowers are pollinated by wasps.

Ficus, Curly

Ficus pumila 'Curly'

2 inch trailing Hanging Baskets
This is not a white variegated creeper. Its leaves are curled up with yellow centers on the underside. It has a twisted curly leaf. It is totally in my ficus collection, leaning toward hanging baskets rather than upright bonsai specimens.

Ficus, Mini Lucie

Ficus benjamina 'Lucie'

12 x 6 inches Bonsai Tree, Indoor Garden
A distinctive curl or wave and a dramatic long tip at the end of each leaf distinguishes this from other ficus trees. Its growth habit and leaf shape are more upright and narrow. New leaves are lighter green, maturing to deeper green which adds character and a sense of age to miniature gardens in pots and in the garden.

Ficus, Tiger Bark

Ficus microcarpa 'Golden Gate'

18 x 18 inches Bonsai Tree
Tiger is in the gray, white-striped bark which adds an exotic touch to this beginner bonsai. Adjusts to indoor living, is fast growing and much easier to grow than traditional junipers.



Ficus, Tiny Limey

Ficus microcarpa 'Melonseed'

18 x 18 inches Tree, R^{XR}, Mini/Faery Garden
It's not a lack of fertilizer. New foliage naturally begins lime green and matures to thick, glossy, dark green foliage for a 3D effect. Single, or multiple, or trunks get larger and thicker with age. Bushier than 'Too Little'.

Ficus, Tiny Oak-Leaf

Ficus pumila 'Quercifolia Minima'

1/4 x 4 inches Terrarium, Houseplant, R^{XR}
Known as "String of Frogs," this creeps and attaches like an ivy with 1/4" oak-leaf shaped foliage. Rather than losing it amid larger garden plants, use this slow moving, mighty groundcover at the base of a bonsai specimen.

Ficus, Too Little

Ficus X 'Too Little'

18 x 18 inches Tree, R^{XR}, Mini/Faery Garden
Layer upon layer of rich green, thumb-sized leaves result in exquisite perfection, and an exact miniature of the classic ficus houseplant. Few plants are better suited as THE tree for tropical landscapes and faery gardens.

Ficus, Triangle Variegated

Ficus triangularis 'Variegata'

24 x 24 inches Bonsai
Look at the green & cream, triangle-shaped leaves that are held on stiff, compact stems. Enjoys bright light indoors but avoid direct sun.



Ficus, Willow-Leaf

Ficus subulata (salicifolia)

3 x 2 feet Tree, R^{XR}, Mini/Faery Garden
It's not a "Willow," however it fits into a tropical landscape as a slow growing tree. Expect "Coppertone" bronze, willow leaf-like foliage when sited in sun, which it can handle. I think it's the easiest ficus of all to grow.

Impatien, Golden Dragon

Impatien repens

24 inch trailing Window Sill, Hanging Baskets
Terrific, rare species that everyone loves. Most people never guess that this is an Impatiens. The stems cascade down 4 feet or more, with tiny, round, yellow flowers as cute as a baby's toes. The large, canary-yellow flowers are a real added bonus. Despite its exotic look, it is so easy to grow. This is an endangered species, thought to be extinct in the wild until it was recently found in Sri Lanka.

Oxalis, Little Plum Crazy

Oxalis spiralis ssp. vulcanicola 'Plum Crazy'

AM Sun+2 6 x 6 inches Edible Flowers
Give it moisture and AM sun, and this patchwork of pink, green, and fuchsia will be vivid, along with its deep pink stems. The yellow flowers taste like "Sweet tarts!" You would be lucky to have this shamrock in a hanging basket or shaded faery garden.



Oxalis, Little Velvet Sunset

Oxalis spiralis ssp. vulcanicola 'Sunset Velvet'

12 x 12 inches Container, Edible Flowers, R^{XR}, Houseplant
We welcome copper-colored plants as a contrast to our sea of green. Foliage transforms from orange to pink with hints of copper that eventually fade to light green in the fall. The addition of sweet-n-sour tasting yellow flowers, spring to summer, pose perfectly over these rustic shamrocks, or on fine entrees at high end restaurants.

Peperomia, Columnar

Peperomia columella

6 x 3 inches Terrariums, Hanging Baskets
Plump and pillowy leaves stack on top of each other so tightly that you can't see the stems. Starts out in columns but eventually settles down over the edge of baskets and containers. Read more to find out how to NOT kill it: <https://plantophiles.com/plant-care/peperomia-columella/>

Peperomia, Pixie

Peperomia meridana 'Pixie'

3 x 3 inches Bonsai Accent, Terrarium, Faery Garden
You'll find this houseplant, a.k.a. "Crazy Quilt Peperomia" in terrariums. Reddish stems balance whorls of glossy, sunken-veined, green foliage that is stacked tightly like shingles, making a compact shrub for faery gardens.

Peperomia, Raisinet

Peperomia caperata quitto

3 x 4 inches Houseplant, Terrariums
Shiny, rich red leaves, deeply crinkled like raisins tempt you to nibble on this possibly tricky houseplant. It's worth trying to get the water timed well, waiting until it's nearly dry before giving it a soak.



Peperomia, String-of-Turtles

Peperomia prostrata

1/2 x 6 inches Terrarium, Hanging Baskets
I call it the "Peace Sign" plant because you can find that symbol etched in a few of the half inch oval leaves. Its creeping compact foliage crawls all along a terrarium floor, given enough light and humidity.



Peperomia, Taco-leaf

Peperomia axillaris

3 x 5 inches Terrarium, Conversation Piece
I would not suggest you eat the foliage but admire the folded leaves and occasional tall, candelabra-like blooms. It happens to like to be snug in a pot so no hurry in re-potting it into a larger home.



Pilea, Trailing Blue Angel

Pilea glaucophylla 'Grezyz'

1 x 12 inches "Jar-Gems"™, Terrariums
Blue with silver-streaked foliage is an uncommon discovery. Tiny, rust red flowers accentuate its pea-sized foliage especially as it trails down the sides of a tropical basket. Need a fast perennial groundcover that is easily trimmed and controlled? Treat as an annual, or dig out a few pieces in the fall and plant inside.



Plectranthus, Ernst Baobab \$9.99

Plectranthus ernstii

AM Sun+2 12 x 12" Bonsai Tree, Houseplant
Conversation piece for its fall through spring, pale lavender-white spires held above scalloped, mint-green, fleshy leaves. The real eye catcher is its swollen tree trunk base, making it look like those wild African baobab trees laden with fruits that get warthogs and monkeys drunk in National Geographic films.



Spikemoss, Golden

Selaginella kraussiana 'Aurea'

AM Sun +2 1 x 6 inch trailing Terrariums, Underplantings
The luminous golden or chartreuse color (depending on if its grown in part or full shade) will light up any damp, shady garden corner. Keep evenly moist and this creeper will form a thick, fun & feathery carpet.

String of Hearts, Variegated \$6.99

Ceropegia linearis sub. woodii variegata

AM Sun +2 3 inch trailing Terrarium, Hanging Baskets
Thick pink, cream, and green, heart-shaped leaves dangle on nearly string stems for cascading baskets and overflowing windowsill pots. Though listed among shade lovers, it can handle more sun. If you plant in the pond in May, you'll notice it has formed swollen, edible flowers when you dig it up for wintering indoors. Parachute-shaped flowers form an ingenious fly trap for this South African native.



String of Pearls, Variegated \$6.99

Curio (Senecio) rowleyanus variegata

AM Sun +2 1 inch trailing Terrarium, Hanging Baskets
White and green, pearl-shaped "beads" grow as a groundcover in the shade of trees in its native South African desert home. Slim, long necked, white flowers appear in summer. Water regularly during the growing season, allowing the soil to dry out between waterings. Reduce watering frequency during the winter months.

Scilla, Mini Leopard Lily

Ledebouria socialis 'Miner'

AM Sun 2 x 4 inches Terrarium, Faery Garden
Clumps of plum-colored bulbs erupt with dark spotted, long leaves, and green and pink, spring floral spikes. Allow soil to dry a little before watering



Syngonium, Pink Petite

Syngonium hybrida

PM Shade 4 x 6 inches Terrarium, Faery, Houseplant
"Arrowhead Plant" is an appropriate common name describing the shape of its leaves. A pale, cream wash is painted on the surface with detailed deep pink veins and light green undersides. Syngoniums' linear look plays well with ficus and begonia in a terrarium. Grows thick so dividing once a year is appreciated by each of their clumps.

Syngonium, White Pixie

Syngonium x 'Pixie'

PM Shade 2 x 3 inches Faery Garden
Forever in search of plants that are NOT the norm, Mark found this green & white-washed terrarium star. It looks like a mini caladium. Grows thickly and quickly, so divide regularly.



Tropical Sun Miniatures \$5.99

(unless otherwise marked)

Along with the tropical shades and succulents, these are great houseplants. May through September enjoy their color in sunny patio pots, railroad or faery gardens, and even in strawberry pots for the succulent types. Come fall rescue them from the frost to winter indoors on a bright windowsill. Like most houseplants, ease up on the winter watering, waiting until the top inch is dry before thoroughly soaking. Drain saucers.



Abromeitiella, Tiny Bromeliad \$6.99

Abromeitiella brevifolia f. chlorantha
PM Sun 2 x 2 inches Bonsai Accent
In its native Argentina, clambering over arid, rocky slopes, it MIGHT get rained on twice a year other than a morning sea fog, now and then. So do not overwater or cuddle- it's quite prickly!

Bougainvillea Pixie Pink & Pixie Queen \$6.99 & 14.99

Bougainvillea 'Pixie Pink' and 'Pixie Queen'
PM Sun 3 x 2 feet Pollinator, Bonsai
Bracts are modified leaves evolved to lure the pollinators (hummingbirds) to its true tiny, white tubular flowers. These bush more than vine, thus they're devoured by bonsai artists. Green foliage mimics the shape of "Pixie Pink's" papery bracts, while Pixie Queen has variegated leaves.

Brazilian Rain Tree \$21.99 or \$44.99

Chloroleucon (Pithecellobium) tortum
AM Sun+2 2 x 2 feet Exotic Bonsai Tree
Keep under two feet with pruning. Rewards include white, powderpuff blossoms which turn yellowish within a few days, followed by curly seed pods. Leaves close at night and the tree looks dead. The next morning the leaves open and the tree is indeed alive. The trunk's exfoliating bark reveals the white inner bark, perfect for bonsai.

Cactus, Dogtail

Strophocactus testudo
AM/PM Sun Hanging Baskets
We like this finger safe cactus from central America where it grows in the trees along with bromeliads. It needs as much sun as possible in the winter with cool temps help. It has white flowers, but avoid harsh summer sun.

Cactus, Thimble \$6.99

Mammillaria gracilis fragilis
PM Sun 1 x 3 inches Houseplant for Beginners
Green globes with white, radial spines are the perfect kids' cactus. Inside, each winter, satiny, cream-colored flowers appear. Break off new clumps (no gloves needed), root and share with an aspiring, young horticulturist.

Chile, Mini Bonsai Tree \$6.99

Capsicum frutescens 'Prik kee noo'
PM Sun 12 x 12 inches Bonsai Tree
"World's Smallest Chile Pepper," and easiest bonsai tree in one season bears burnt orange fruits & equally tiny leaves. Yes, its fiercely, firey, pointed fruits are edible, but give folks fair warning.

Citrus, World's Smallest \$10.49

Citrus japonica 'Hindsii' (Fortunella hindsii)
PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Novelty Houseplant
Known as "Hong Kong Kumquat," it bears round, orange fruits that rarely exceed 1/2 inch in diameter. The tree is also small and spiny with tiny, narrow leaves. Fruits are red orange at maturity and hold on tight. The rind is thin, sealing in several large seeds in each fruit. Edible but more of a novelty.

Coleonema, Confetti Tree \$6.99 & 14.99

Coleonema pulchrum
PM Sun 12 x 12 inches Bonsai
An airy cloud of fragrant, bright green leaves tipped with aromatic pink flowers prove why it's known as "Pink Breath of Heaven." In contrast, this sturdy South African bush is drought and wind tolerant.

Coleus, (Mini) Autumn Maple \$6.99

Coleus X 'Tiny Red Toes'
PM Sun 10 x 10 inches Bonsai, RXXR
Witness the autumn colors of red and gold then bring it inside for a tabletop garden, bonsai tree, or an elegant houseplant.

Coleus, Marrakesh \$5.99

Coleus x 'Marrakesh'
PM Sun 14 x 14 inches Bonsai, Patio Pots
Forget the flowers when you have unusually deep red and gold mounds that love the sun. Don't hide this in the shade!

Coleus, (Mini) Red-Leaf \$6.99

Coleus X 'Cantigny Royale'
PM Sun 12 x 12 inches RXXR
Even beginning bonsai students can grow on their way to a show. Easier to grow, in a matter of weeks, rich red foliage intensifies as it nears Halloween.

Coprosma, Kiwi Gold \$6.99

Coprosma prostrata 'Kiwi Gold'
PM Sun 1 x 3 feet Hanging Basket
This New Zealand native is noted for its buttery gold splattered, glossy, green leaves. Prostrata, in the species name hints, it is a trailer for tropical hanging baskets and a groundcover.

ELFIN HERB \$6.99

Years ago Ben asked Mark, "What's the name of that pretty flower?" "Elfin Herb," he told Ben, who responded as any 4 year old would and asked why? "Because," Mark said, "faeries like to use flowers as little hats. Elves, who like to play tricks, run by and snatch the flowers right off the faeries' heads." Months later, Ben still remembered the name.

Elfin Herb

Cuphea hyssopifolia
PM Sun 1 x 1 foot Faery Tree, RXXR garden
Who can pass up a blooming tree that even a beginner can grow to flower most of the year? A lower limb off here, a branch that crosses that other branch over there. In no time, you've just sculpted a tree. Elfin herbs come in baby pink, red, rose, purple, or pristine white.

Erodium, Faery Double Rose \$6.99

Erodium X variable 'Flore Pleno.'
PM Sun 2 x 12 inches Flowering Shrub
The first time I spied this was at a distance in our greenhouse I thought it was a true dwarf geranium. "No," Mark said, "but it's related. If you can grow rosemary indoors, you can keep this going." It rarely stops showing off its dainty pink, red-streaked, fully double flowers. It is the ideal tabletop landscape. Indoors keep at 60°, water only when soil is dry, and put it next to your brightest window. Likely the most popular bonsai accent plant in our entire collection

Erodium, Faery White \$6.99

Erodium reichardii 'Album'
PM Sun 5 x 8 inches Alpine Shrub in Faery Garden
As this is the largest of our erodiums and most free blooming, it is easier to see the resemblance to its perennial geranium cousins. Here, where bigger is not necessarily better, there's still room for it in a railroad landscape, larger pot, or perennial border.

Gasteria, Lilliput \$5.99

Gasteria lilliputana
PM Sun 3 x 3 inches Windowsill Bloomer
On a list of rare South African plants, you will find this curious succulent. The mottled leaves of young plants are distichous (arranged in twos, opposite each other) and look quite different to the elongated adult leaves. Six inch spikes dangle nectar rich, tubular, red-pink flowers. Native to rocky, poor soils, dry out in between watering. It is happy to share its space with other succulents.

Ice Plant, M & Mini Sunshine

Delosperma rogersii 'Mulberry Mini Sunshine'
3 x 8 inches "Jar Gem"™, Faery, RXXR garden
Bright yellow flowers are featured on this Mulberry Creek discovery. We selected this seedling because of its slightly larger and distinctly brighter yellow flowers than the original species. Same tight mound with flowers that rarely stop blooming during the summer, given enough water and fertilizer.

JADE, Tropical

Jades are in the genus Crassula and are native to South Africa. They self-bonsai, that is random limbs shrivel and fall off which enhances air circulation and allows more sunlight to enter. New babies start to root below the mother plant. **AM/PM Sun unless marked**

Jade, Mini Kitty \$5.99

Crassula marginalis v. 'Minuta Variegata'
1 x 6 inches Baskets, Rock Gardens
Jades aren't often known for spilling over baskets, or for having tricolored white, pink and green, thin, overlapping leaves like this one. Though it thrives in bright sun, watch it on the hottest days of the summer. Water if needed.

Jade, Tiger \$5.99

Crassula picturata
AM Sun+2 2 x 4 inches Windowsill Bloomer
Purple-black dots on top and a purple wash on the undersides of leaves are well "designed." Rosettes hold a halo of the lightest pink shaded flowers, late summer. If the general tone of the foliage turns red, you might back off on watering. Especially indoors in winter, keep on the dry side.

Jade, Tom Thumb

Crassula rupestris ssp. commutata
3 x 6 inches Rock Walls & Gardens
Another South African native, it is well-adapted to hot, dry rocky slopes. Its thick, triangular leaves stay tiny but store enough water to help the plant endure extended drought. Full day sun brings out their fine red margins. It thrives in well-draining pots and gritty soil, only occasionally needing a deep watering when the soil is fully dry. From spring to mid-summer, 'Tom Thumb' can display neat clusters of tiny white flowers.

Life Saver Plant or Huernia \$6.99

Huernia zebrina magniflora
AM Sun+2 1 x 8 inches Houseplant for Beginners, Bonsai Accent
Absolutely the most bizarre flower we have offered in awhile! It looks like a wine-colored, "Gummy Lifesaver" was plonked in the middle of each yellowish with wine-red, lined, star shaped flowers. In the shadow of these stars, rise 4 angled cactus spires.

Monanthes, Canary Islands \$6.99

Monanthes polyphylla
AM Sun +2 2 x 4 inches Windowsills
The tiniest of rosettes, stacked with plump leaves reside at the tips of thin stems keeping company with yellow flowers in summer. Native to the Canary Islands, it is related to jade, hen&chicks, and echeveria. A little picky to grow- not too much sun & not to much shade. Do not overwater.

Monkeywort, Creeping Blue

Lindernia grandiflora
AM Sun 1 x 12 inches Basket Queen, Groundcover
Go bananas over the dark blue and white flowers that rarely quit, above glossy, green, heart-shaped leaves. This heat loving groundcover is slow to spread as it is fixated on flowering. Next fall, dig up this Florida native for a rainforest garden.

Monterey Cypress, Lemon Scented \$14.99

Cypress macrocarpa 'Goldcrest'

AM/PM Sun 6 x 24 inches Tree, R_{XR}, Faery

Can you believe a lemon-scented conifer? This golden, narrow, lemon, "Pine-sol"-scented pillar needs annual pruning to keep it compact. Sadly, not winter hardy but it is easily overwintered. Mine is in a bright, south facing window above the sink, for easy, every other day watering. It actually looks BETTER than when I first brought it in. AMAZING, since many plant just tolerant the indoors.



Myrtle, Mini Variegated \$6.99

Myrtus communis var. tarentenia 'Microphylla Variegata'

PM Sun 1 - 3 x 3 feet Winter Houseplant, Culinary

Prized by topiary and bonsai enthusiasts for its white flowers, white-striped variegated foliage and semi-weeping form. Mini black fruits form late summer. From the Mediterranean, it is used sparingly to flavor lamb and other meats.

Oregano, Micro-Silver

Oregano microphyllum

AM/PM Sun 5 x 4 inches Faery Garden, Culinary

Yes, it is a truly tiny, silver, powerfully flavored oregano that overwinters indoors (just like any rosemary) by sunny, cold (50°), drafty, windows. Deep purple flowers show up late summer. We hope that you'll help us introduce this unique oregano to other gardeners but be sure to tell them it's not a thyme!



Pelargonium, Mini Zonal Red

Pelargonium X 'Friesdorf'

PM Sun 5 x 5 inches Houseplant, Container, Border

'Friesdorf' (named for the horse-shoe-shaped band of dark color on the leaves) is a miniature zonal geranium with rounded, green to plum colored leaves, and single, lipstick crimson flower clusters. Remove dead flowers to foster new growth. It scares me how often and abundantly it flowers!

Pillow Plant (or Plectranthus)

Coleus prostratus

AM Sun+2 2" Trailing Hanging Basket, Containers

String of Pillows (was Plectranthus but now Coleus prostratus) is a delicate, lime-green string of succulent leaves. It hangs and trails from pots and providing red flowers all summer. Although it thrives in partial sun, it does have a minimal burgundy pattern if sun stressed. It readily roots from cuttings along the stem and grows vigorously.

Dropped variety


Pomegranate, Mulberry Miniature \$6.99 and up

Punica granatum 'Mulberry Creek'

AM Sun+2 12 x 12 inches Bonsai, Edible Fruit, Ornamental, Faery Tree

Bonsai enthusiasts love the twisting trunks of this South Asian native that are conducive to a funky, ancient, gnarly form. Bright orange fruits are encouraged by a bit of sun to ripen fruit. A Mulberry Creek selection that is fast traveling around the trade as it is super dwarf, never stops blooming and makes great fruit. Our selection from over 1000 seedlings.

Overwintered as tropical houseplant or loses leaves in fall and kept at 30 45 degrees until spring. Sounds somewhat complicated but it's worth it. When in doubt check out the "You-Tube" videos.



CREATING A MINIATURE LANDSCAPE

1. Choose plants that share the same conditions. (In this example, all are "Tropical Suns.")

2. Fill a shallow pot with potting soil, mounding it. Plant the tree first. We like it off center.

3. Add rocks to hold the soil in place.



4. Add shrubs and groundcovers that vary in texture, and color for interest.


5. Add gravel for a path, more rocks, a bench, a figurine....

6. Water "softly" but deeply.



6. In the winter, place next to a bright window. Water when dry on top.

7. Ideally place outside in summer, in indirect sun and water, likely daily.



Privet, Mini Yellow \$6.99 & \$14.99

Lonicera nitida 'Baggesen's Gold'

AM Sun+2 3 x 3 feet Topiary

Imagine an English privet hedge, outlining a semi-shaded faery garden. Golden yellow leaves share space on this well branched plant. Although it can grow to 3 feet, it does so slowly and is easily pruned. Use as a bonsai, shrub, or a tree in a mini backyard cloister garden.



Rosemary, Baby P.J.

Rosmarinus officinalis 'Baby P.J.'

AM/PM Sun 6 x 18 inches Bonsai, Culinary, Containers

Possibly the "World's Smallest" rosemary has returned to exhibit its tiny needle leaves and equally compact growth for any whimsical dish garden or bonsai. Along with clippings in shaping the rosemary, it provides plenty of new shoots for cooking. Many rosemaries don't bloom until late fall but Baby P.J. usually puts on a summer show of dark blue flowers, also edible.

Sedum, Fickle Pickles

Sedum pruinosum

AM/PM Sun 2 x 4 inches Miniature Succulent Gardens

Pruinosum translates to "frosty" referring to foliage. White washed over green-blue, half inch, pickle-shaped leaves, form a dense, ordinary succulent shrub. But its white flowers in summer demand your attention. Like other members in the Crassula family (jade & monanthes), it too is from South Africa. To simulate those conditions, plant in porous soil, water sparingly in winter (maybe 2-3 times a month) and more often in summer.

Sedum, Japanese Golden

Sedum makinoi 'Ogon'

PM Sun 2 x 8 inches Bonsai Accent, Groundcover

"Sedum, Voodoo" and this rare cultivar inspired our "Jar Gem" series, or plants perfectly suited to the cramped quarters and dry, severe conditions of strawberry jars. Like Goldilocks, this plant's color indicates the degree of light- it whitens with too much sun and turns chartreuse if the light is too low. If you get the light exposure just right, it glows golden as it creeps.

Sedum, Mini Me Jelly Bean

Sedum rubrotinctum 'Mini Me'

PM Sun 2 x 4 inches Baby Shower Favors

Soft, succulent, round leaves spiral up each short stem. Starts with a lime-green base that blushes red to copper with increased exposure to direct sun; exactly what it enjoys in its native Mexico. Don't fret if a few beans drop!



Sedum, Tokyo Sun

Sedum japonicum 'Tokyo Sun'

AM Sun+2 2 x 4 inches Drought Tolerant Groundcover

A shaded site turns the foliage light lime-green but afternoon sun turns the foliage almost white and could burn it. We like a morning sun location where the leaves turn a "just right" golden color. We use this variety in miniature landscapes because the leaves are smaller, so it is appropriately scaled for tinier tasks. Actually tasty in salads too!

SERISSA \$6.99 & \$14.99

As a "pro plant tester" with fairly neglectful ways, I can testify: these flowering trees are hard to kill, despite their reputation. Indoors simply grow in a generous pot with good houseplant potting soil, not necessarily bonsai soil. Allow the soil to dry somewhat between watering, but never bone dry. Place on a bright windowsill with cool temps (60°). Outdoors, provide morning sun and an occasional soak.

Serissa or Snowrose, Cherry Blossom

Serissa foetida 'Cherry Blossom' (rosea)

PM Sun 2 x 2 feet R_{XR} or Bonsai Tree

Green and white foliage carry single pink flowers. This is easily trained into a tree BUT does not like to dry out. See Mark's cherry blossom sprig to the right.

Serissa or Snowrose, Double White

Serissa foetida 'Fleno-Flora'

PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Mini Tree, R_{XR}

This all green, tropical shrub looks like a mini magnolia tree but blooms most of the year. It is an ideal bonsai specimen. Grows best when temps are above 60° which is when you should fertilize at half strength, monthly. Pruning is most effective in spring.



Serissa or Snowrose, Pink Mountain

Serissa foetida 'Pink Mountain'

PM Sun 2 x 2 feet Mini Tree, R_{XR}, Houseplant

Beauty lies in its striking, variegated foliage rather than its occasional pink flowers. It also prefers temperatures above 60° and shouldn't get bone dry. Consider applying a thick mulch around the root zone in the summer to conserve soil moisture, a wise move for most any plant.

Serissa or Snowrose, Tiny Kyoto

Serissa foetida 'Kyoto'

PM Sun 1 x 1 foot Mini Tree, R_{XR}, Houseplant

As "Serissas" go, this is the tiniest leaved variety, although it grows rather quickly. "Tiny Kyoto" is precisely proportioned as a tree for the smallest scale railroad, or as a shrub in large scale. Occasionally we're treated to its rare, white-pink, tiny trumpet-shaped flowers.

Skeleton Plant

Corokia cotoneaster

PM Sun 8 x 18 inches Tree in Halloween Mini Garden

This rare collector's plant has grey-green leaves that become increasingly tiny and gray, if exposed to more sun. One winter, Karen bet Mark these bizarre trees were too weird to sell. Ask Mark about the prize. Mark created an outrageous Halloween miniature landscape that included this spooky cemetery tree combined with dark tufts of sedge and creeping faery ferns.

Trichodiadema or Desert Bonsai \$6.99 & 22.99

Trichodiadema bulbosum

PM Sun 2 x 4 inches Beginner Bonsai

This South African succulent is known as "African Bonsai" for its origin and natural tree habit. Stems thicken at the base like a baobab tree. Don't be intimidated by the crown of bristles sprinkled over the gray to greenish leaves. Branches are pretty soft, hosting magenta flowers throughout the year. The roots have been used to hasten the fermentation for bread and beer.



Zanthoxylum, Bonsai \$6.99

Zanthoxylum odorum

AM Sun+2 3 x 3 feet (10 years) Bonsai

Lip gloss shiny, peppery flavored green leaves are the rage among "Iron Chefs." Grows wild in Asia, this "Yellow wood tree" transforms with minor training into a perfect bonsai destined as a mini tree or railroad accent.

SUN-LOVING SUCCULENTS

4" clay pots @ \$8.99 " clay pots @ \$18.99

Too large to be miniatures and not for your dinner plate, we reserve this section for indoor, hard-to-kill houseplants that double as outdoor strawberry Jar Gems and fun herb companions. With the exception of "Scillas," most prefer sun. However, if the tips start to brown or the leaves bronze, that could be too little water or too much sun, so make adjustments. This is just a teaser. AEONIUM \$8.99

Aeoniums are monocarpic, meaning "They flower-They Die." Keep the colorful foliage but prevent flowers by trimming any branch that exceeds 8". Cut off the rosette tips, leaving 6 to 8 leaves at the top of the branch resulting in a long-lived, lush plant & tip cuttings for more.

Aeonium, Kiwi

Aeonium haworthii 'Kiwi'

PM Sun 6 x 6 inches Houseplant

Green, cream and plum-lined foliage is smaller, easier to grow and mounding, unlike the popular Dr. Seuss tree forms of "Schwartzkopf, Voodoo & Sunburst." Translation? - It's a tad bit more disciplined.



Aeonium, Schwartzkopf

Aeonium arboreum 'Schwartzkopf'

PM Sun 4 x 18 inches Centerpiece Houseplant

Dark green, 4" rosettes deepen in color to nearly black in summer as the German "Schwartzkopf," or "black head" name dictates. Has nothing to do with teenagers other than it is a DRAMATIC topper in large strawberry jars!

Aeonium, Tricolor

Aeonium haworthii 'Variegatum'

PM Sun 6 x 18 inches Houseplant, Jar-Gems™

Add bold texture and color to your strawberry jar with 3" rosettes of green and white striped foliage that blush pink in full sun. In September, simply cut off some end rosettes and stick in a sandy mix. Keep moist until rooted for more carefree and colorful houseplants, OR you could dig up & bring in the whole thing.



Aeonium, Voodoo

Aeonium x 'Voodoo'

PM Sun 8 x 18 inches

About 20 green centered, purple-edged, fleshy lobes compete to form a 12" rosette and secure a vivid focal point in a tropical mixed container. Seek out a sophisticated vase to match so you can enjoy fresh cuts in winter, as you dream of its native Canary Islands.

Beyond the popular Aloe vera, we also offer ornamental aloes. They possess that unique star-shape in many forms and colors. All qualify as "most likely to succeed." If they start to bronze, cut back on light.

Aloe vera (*Aloe barbadensis miller*) and (*Aloe var. chinensis*)

We offer two varieties: "Miller" shows off wide, plump leaves resulting in a larger plant, while "Chinensis" is a slim version with white spots. Both hold anti-inflammatory, antiseptic and antibiotic gel, and edible (tastes like raw green beans) orange flowers sporadically throughout the year.

Aloe, Blue Elf

Aloe x 'Blue Elf'

1 x 2 feet

Rock & Xerophytic Gardens, Containers

This fuss-free succulent thrives in the heat, poor soil and small spaces. Narrow, upright, blue-gray leaves contrast nicely with the pale orange flower spikes. Foliage tips may have a reddish tinge in extreme temps.



Aloe, Ice Queen

Aloe x 'Ice Queen'

6 x 6 inches

No medicinal cooling gel in these nearly white washed leaves. Its irregular green pattern on each leaf sets the stage for the yellow, apricot, and red blooms that appear as they please, but often.



Aloe, Walmsley Variegated

Aloe x 'Walmsley Bronze' Variegated 6 x 6 inches

This plant has chameleon-like qualities. In a shady spot, it is bright green with strong, white variegation and open rosettes. In a full-sun setting, it grows compact, full, and it takes on a deep chocolate brown to maroon hue with off-white striation. It is very prolific!

Echeveria, Peacock Blue

Echeveria peacockii ssp. *subsessilis*

PM Sun 1 x 5 inches

Beginner Houseplant

Lovely rosettes are packed with powder blue leaves that are obovate (tear-dropped shaped), acuminate (tapering to a long point), keeled (shaped like a flat bottomed boat), thick, pruinose (powdery wash) and (sessile) are attached directly to the base stem without a stalk. Back to English, in winter hold back watering until really dry for the best color and health.

Echeveria, Topsy Turvy

Echeveria runyonii 'Topsy Turvy'

PM Sun 8 x 8 inches

Jar-Gems™

Got friends with a black thumb? Encourage them to try echeverias. This one is particularly forgiving. I bring it indoors in the winter, find a sunny spot, give it a soak until it drips and let it get bone-dry before I water again. I am rewarded with wavy, blue rosettes and eventually orange-red, bell flowers that hang from shepherd-hook stalks each summer outside. Plant in terra cotta pots or a strawberry jar to match the flower color.



Euphorbia, Pencil Fire Sticks

Euphorbia tirucalli var. *rosea*

PM Sun 2 x 2 feet RXR Tree, "Jar-Gems"

We started growing this multi-colored pencil cactus for our tropical Jar Gem collection, but after seeing it in a California RXR set-up in "Garden Railroad" magazine, we have doubled the number of plants each year. Other species stay green but this selection is truly this red, orange and yellow with a touch of pink inside in the cooler months. HOT!!



Ice Plant, Heart-Leaf Variegated

Aptenia cordata 'Variegata'

PM Sun 3 feet Groundcover, Baskets

Check another "Holy Grail" off Mark's list. While researching "Heart-Leaf Carpet Apple" there was a reference to a strongly variegated form with red flowers, and he found it. True to its flashy description, it sells out fast so don't hesitate. Buy early!



SUCCULENTS: "Winter Torture/Summer Love"

Winter indoors at 55° by a bright window, and soak when bone dry. Summer outside in PM Sun, *water deeply anytime, & fertilize monthly. *In many of their native homes, summer is monsoon season so loving them with water is in their genetic memory and preps them for winter.

Jade, Gollum (Shrek's Ears)

Crassula x 'Gollum'

PM Sun 12 x 12 inches Strawberry Jar

Every customer who comments knows this plant's common name before reading its label. It really mimics that green ogre's ears. Use as a tree in a dish garden or strawberry jar topper. More fun than a "Venus Fly Trap."



Jade, String of Buttons Variegated

Crassula perforata 'Variegata'

PM Sun 2 x 12 inches Easy Houseplants

Here is the hit of our Christmas openhouse. When customers "swam" in our sea of succulents, over half chose this ornamental of creamy white, flat leaves with green center bands, layered thickly on top of one another like stacked plates.



Jade, Sunset

Crassula argentea 'Hummel's Sunset'

PM Sun 18 x 18 inches Houseplant, Exotic Garden

AKA "Golden Jade" for its spectacular golden and cranberry jade leaves. Spring colors are muted but intensify with cooler temps and dry conditions. Over fertilizing can dim colors too. The late fall to winter flowers are white with a hint of lavender. Prune branches to reveal its classic stocky trunk.



Jade, Totally Tubular

Crassula tubulifolia

PM Sun 18 x 18 inches Houseplants

Care for this as you would any other jade for years of pleasure in a mini landscape. Outdoors, it enjoys a life of leisure in the sun with extra water, especially in pots. Compared to "Shrek's Ears," leaves are rolled up tight with less flare and it grows more like a tree. Totally tubular, man.



Jade, Variegated

Crassula argentea 'Variegata'

PM Sun 2 x 2 feet

Ornamental Houseplant

Take a clue from its species: argentea refers to silver or white. Artistic strokes of creamy white shimmer in the summer sun while airbrushed pink margins deepen on the foliage by fall. With such natural beauty and tolerance of our dry home, it's a pleasure to have this jade inside for the winter. Give it room as it eventually reaches a couple of feet or more.



Portulacaria, Mini Elephant

Bonsai Tree, RXR, Houseplants



When soil is super dry, I take the plants to my sink, soak them, drain the saucer, put them back and wait until it's dry again. We also offer reasonably priced houseplants in the fall like sansevieria, calathea, pothos, palms, and more.

AM Sun+2

3 x 12 inches Dorm Room Plant, Baskets



Mark is a hard core Star Wars AND Star Trek fan so when he noticed the soft, white hair fringe around greenish-plum leaves, well who can resist Baby Yoda? Purple and orange toned flowers show up irregularly. Survives the neglect of college dorm room. (Please don't tell George Lucas.)

Fern, Rabbit's Foot \$5.99

Davallia tyermannii

PM Shade 8 x 8 inches Hanging Basket, Terrarium

Imagine rabbit paws or tarantula legs dangling over the pot's rim. Provide this plant with its own humidifier by placing the pot on a saucer filled with pebbles and water. Striking pink, white, yellow and shades of green foliage set the stage for white, star-shaped clusters that smell like sweet vanilla and chocolate!

Hoya, Mini Splash Plant

Hoya curtisii

3 x 18 inches

Small round or heart-shaped, olive-green with gray variegated leaves form a compact vine meant for a basket. Cream petals with rose blooms are fuzzy, and their fragrance is said to resemble melon or citrus notes.



Rhipsalis ewaldiana



Three-sided stems carry white flowers. Starts upright but eventually hangs 2 feet or more.

Rhipsalis, Drunkard's Dream

Rhipsalis bambusoides (Hatiora salicornioides)



Name refers to its wine bottle shaped flowers. Overall stiff, but arching sprays that overflow.

Rhipsalis, Mistletoe Cactus

Rhipsalis pilocarpa



By fall, fine white hairs on flowers become red tinged by the sun. Red to maroon fruits appear

Select early, medium and late varieties to extend harvest over a month. Generally, fruit will bear next year and continue for decades with a little maintenance. Well worth the wait and investment. BLACKBERRY BUSHES \$15.99

Avoid planting blackberries in soils where previous crops have included strawberries, raspberries, potatoes, tomatoes, eggplants, or peppers. These crops may harbor soil pathogens, which will affect the health and performance of your new plants.

PRIME ARK (fall/maybe spring)- super large & tasty on thornless vines

BLUEBERRY BUSHES \$19.99 gallon pot

Space your bushes for the eventual 4 foot spread, in full sun. Essential for thick smoothies, in green salads & fruit kabobs, and especially scones with a lemon glaze (as well as the chance of improving your eyesight & memory.) Fruits bear from July 1 (early) to mid September (very late).

Pick in April & May for best flavor by pulling the ruby red stalks away from the center, starting the second year after planting. **AVOID** eating the leaves which can cause gastric distress due go high amounts of oxalic acid, especially if you are prone to kidney stones. Fertilize as stalks emerge.

***VICTORIA**- English heirloom pie variety with rosy-red stocks; long season

FRUIT PRUNING & FEEDING:

Mark simplified this in a few easy steps.

BLUEBERRY BUSHES and NANKING CHERRIES:

Remove the oldest canes that are heavily branched, down to the soil line. Of all the soft, pliable, new shoots (Mark calls suckers), choose the most robust and leave it. Cut out all other shoots to the ground. Apply 2 cups low acid fertilizer per bush.



RASPBERRIES:

After fruiting, remove the canes that just bore the fruit, down to the ground. If necessary, clip the new canes (suckers) to three feet tall. Fertilize in March with a low acid fertilizer, 2 cups per 3 feet of canes.

STRAWBERRIES:

After fruiting, narrow bed down to just 2 feet across. It will widen. Fertilize with a 4-6-4 fertilizer in March.

Theoretically it is the number of days from seed to harvest, though the important part is showing relative maturity. Like in the cabbages, FARAO (64 days) ripens months before *DANISH BALLHEAD (100 days).

Planted in the spring, generally speaking:

- 50-60 day varieties are ready to harvest by late May
- 70-80 day crops roughly July
- 90 to 100+ days start to peak in September

Many 50-60 day crops can be seeded in June for fall harvest.

Beets love cool weather so seeding around April 20th to May 1st is ideal.

BROCCOLI

Harvest before flower buds open, cutting the central head at a 45° angle. Side shoots will develop and are harvested throughout the season.

BELSTAR (66 days)- fresh broccoli spring & beyond due to heat tolerance
*DeCICCO (48 days)- revered Italian heirloom; mini heads of broccoli
IMPERIAL (66 days)- large green heads come on summer and early fall
PURPLE MAGIC (62 days)- purple domes with violet stems early spring

BRUSSEL SPROUTS

Pull leaves off bottom third of stalks in August to enhance air flow and expose insects' party place. Harvest 1-1/2" fully developed heads after a fall frost for higher sugar content.

CATSKILL (90 days)- huge, 2" round, green sprouts on strong stalks with many heads
RUBINE (155 days)- 2" purple sprouts; decorate 24" stems; harvest in November

CABBAGE

Harvest full head ideally before it splits, cutting right at the base and keeping the outer 2 or 3 wrapper leaves to protect against bruising.

BEST GARDENING ADVICE?

DO NOT RUSH TO GET VEGETABLES INTO THE GARDEN

1. The ground is often too wet in early spring. Working in wet soil ruins it!
2. Like many of us, bugs often prefer cooler temps. You often miss a crop of bugs when you plant later than the traditional times. This is especially true for warm crops like tomatoes (which I plant late May) and hot crops like squash (which I often don't get around to until mid June.)

CARROTS Sold as seed only

Seed carrots about 1/2" apart starting April 15th. Thin to an inch apart.

CAULIFLOWER

Harvest when flowerets just begin to separate and look slightly "ricey." Be sure to plant these by late April OR plant in June for a fall garden.

ASIAN GREEN STEM (42 days)- sweeter, tender, long stems for dipping
EARLISNOW (45 days)- white heads ripen before summer's heat
CLEMENTINE (55 days)- brightest and earliest orange heads for summer or fall
PURPLE MOON (62 days)- exceptionally early purple cauliflower in spring; or June planted for a fall crop
ROMANESCO (78 days)- multi-spiraled, lime green; nutty flavored (pictured right)



CELERIAC & CELERY

Fertilize well & water regularly. Amsterdam celery is just leaves while celeriac is a baseball-sized root. Full stalked varieties require weekly, deep watering.



AMSTERDAM CELERY (see page 6 in herb section)
CELERIAC, BRILLIANT (100 days)- lift celery-flavored, ugly, 4" creamy, white roots in September (see pic)
PEPPERMINT STICK (80 days)- striped red & white stalks with full-flavored leaves and stalks
TANGO (85 days)- non-stringly, crumchy, 20" stalks

CORN, SWEET Sold as seed only

Sow 2 seeds, an inch deep, about a garden hoe's width or 9" apart starting May 1st. Stop sowing by June 1st unless you don't mind the worms!

Fertilize at planting and water deeply, weekly. Harvest before cucumbers plump up and yellow for best flavor.

GREENS



Check daily and harvest in April or early May before temps rise. Heights and leaf lengths are added as a guide to when they're ready. Most greens prefer the cool weather and can be planted late summer for fall harvest, as a frost sweetens their flavors. All definitely qualify as SUPERFOODS!

ARUGULA, Astro (38 days)- leaves & flowers= spicy/nutty salads & stir-fry
*COLLARDS, Georgia (70 days)- 3' tall; 2' leaf; thrives in heat; from 1880's
*KALE, Dinosaur (62 days)- add rustic flavor to soups, stews & grains; 18"
KALE, Ironman Mix (30 days)- pick at 2" for powerful smoothies & salads
KALLARD, Sweet Karoline (75 days)- totally new vegetable! kale x collards
MESCLUN MIX (30 days)- frilly mix of crunch lettuces and tangy mustards

KOLIBRI (45 days)- 3" deep-purple bulbs with white inside
KONAN (43 days)- 3" white globes; try the leaves!

LEEKs


Regularly pulling dirt around their stems creates a longer, more usable white portion. Harvest leeks anytime they are 1/2 to 1" in diameter (late August through November) depending on the variety.

BANDIT (100 days)- easy to clean, very thick shaft, winter hardy
KING RICHARD (75 days)- extra early; pick baby to full-sized by Sept. 1st
TADORNA (110 days)- vigorous, healthy growth ready around Halloween

Harvest by cutting at 1-2" above the ground, thereby not harming the growing point & allowing for regrowth. Young leaves taste best, but rinsing them under warm tap water may reduce bitterness if picked late.

When dandelions start to turn yellow, it's time to put tubers in a trench, cover with 3" of dirt, and hill up around each plant as it grows until you've got 6" mounds. Dig potatoes (usually starting in July) when bushes turn brown. Early to late season usually isn't more than a month. Cover dug spuds with a cloth to block out light but not ventilation. Toss blemished ones before you store them in a cool, dark spot.



- *CARIBBEAN RED (105 days)- up to twice as hot as a regular habanero
- *GHOST: (85 days)- heirloom variety from India; known as bhut jolokia
- *CAROLINA REAPER (105 days)- world's hottest chile from 2013 to 2023

PEPPER X currently holds the title as the world's hottest pepper. This fiery chili was cultivated by the Pucker butt Pepper Company, (that's not a typo) located in South Carolina, USA. We will NOT be selling this satanic mutant.

TOMATOES:

Most are indeterminate, meaning tall vines that fruit all season and need staking. Exceptions, are noted with a "D" for **determinate**, translating to usually compact vines, (good for large pots) and a shorter fruiting season. I still stake them, in a pot or in the ground. It's just healthier.

- *BLACK CHERRY (64 days)- almost black, round fruit with heirloom taste
- *FANTASTICO (60 days/D)- 1/2 oz grape in long clusters, high yields, for pots
- *INDIGO CHERRY DROPS (71 days)- dark purple, anthocyanin-rich cherries
- *MATT'S WILD CHERRY (60 days)- early, crazy yields, true tomato flavor

- *PASTE MONSTER (89 days)- giant, 10 oz. ruffled red fruits, balanced flavor
- *SAN MARZANO (80 days)- ruby red, 4 oz., few seeds, easy to peel; sauce
- *SPECKLED ROMAN (85 days)- 4" long, orange streaks; thick, meaty flesh
- *SUNRISE SAUCE (57 d/D)- low maintenance, orange paste for containers

COCKTAIL GARDENING:

Creating a collection of plants inviting to pollinators and people:
Includes traditional flowering plants that lure beneficial pollinators
and delicious edible flower and leaves for beverages

(Notes from a talk given at Schedel Arboretum)

MORE THAN JUST BUTTERFLIES, pollinators include:

- Insects (bees, wasps, moths, butterflies, flies, beetles)
- Birds (including hummingbirds), mammals, flying foxes, fruit bats, possums, lemurs & geckos, worldwide

PLANNING YOUR GARDEN

- LOCATION: sunny spot with protection from the wind
- WELL DRAINING SOIL
- PLANT CONSIDERATIONS: Host plants & Nectar plants; Annual vs. tender vs. hardy perennial
Native plants vs. Non-native plants Seeds vs. Plants- (how much time vs. money)
- PLANT IN BLOCKS OF COLORS; bright colors preferred
- SELECT FLOWERS FOR EVERY SEASON from early spring to fall
- CONVERT YOUR LAWN: Google "New Vegetable Garden: how to get started" (video on creating a raised bed in an hour)
- CONSIDER POLLINATOR CORRIDORS: strips of land that connect habitats and provide food and shelter for pollinators
- PROVIDE SHELTER FOR POLLINATORS: overhangs, nesting sites, leaf litter, and dead wood with holes drilled
- AVOID PESTICIDES & MOW WHEN POLLINATORS AREN'T ACTIVE
- PROVIDE A CLEAN WATER SOURCE YEAR ROUND
- MINIMIZE OUTDOOR LIGHTING
- OBSERVE, TAKE NOTES: What are the most popular plants? When are the pollinators active?

SPECIFICS-

BUTTERFLIES NEED HOST PLANTS to lay their eggs. When the caterpillar hatches from its egg, it will feed on its host plant. Some butterflies use only one kind of plant as a host, whereas other butterflies use several different species.

- herbs like asclepias (butterfly or milkweeds), baptisia, citrus, dill, echinacea, fennel, hops, nasturtiums, parsley, verbena
- flowers such as aster, black-eyed susan
- shrubs such as spicebush
- grasses like little bluestem and orchard grass
- vines such as passion flower and pipevine
- trees like elm, dogwood, pawpaw, prickly ash, sassafras, sweet bay, magnolia, and willow

ADULT BUTTERFLIES NEED NECTAR PLANTS attracted by solid masses of color, flower fragrance, and flower shape.

- herbs like bee balms, butterflyweed, catnip, chives, echinacea, mint, lavender, oregano, sage, verbena, and thyme
- flowers like aster, black-eyed susan, liatris, cardinal flower, coreopsis, cosmos, lantana, sunflowers, violets, sedum & zinnia
- shrubs like butterfly bush
- vines such as passion flower
- trees like chaste tree & flowering dogwood

HUMMINGBIRDS' IDEAL SPOT FOR A FEEDER is hanging from a gutter, awning, or gazebo where it sparkles, but is still shaded during the heat of the day. Site within 10 feet of a protective cover to provide shelter and a perch for a resting refuge.

- hummers like brightly colored, tubular flowers:
- anise hyssop, bee balm, cleome, columbine, foxglove, daylilies, hollyhocks, impatiens, lupine, and salvias (a.k.a. sages)

BEES like basil, borage, chamomile, chives, coneflowers, lavender, thyme, goldenrod, zinnias

- single-petaled, colorful (especially blue, white, yellow, purple & violet) flowers
- shelter & food in the form of wildflowers
- water stations with shallow dishes of water and pebbles for bees to safely land and drink
- avoid pesticide use around plants that attract bee

MORE POLLINATOR FRIENDLY PLANT COMBINATIONS FOR OHIO: Flowers planted in and near fruit & vegetable gardens help bring pollinators into the garden, providing food for pollinators, esp. in the heat of summer, and a bigger harvest by the plants.

- herbs like anise hyssop, angelica, basil, borage, calendulas, catmint, chives, cilantro, citrus, dill, fennel, lavender, mint, nasturtiums, oregano, parsley, sage, thyme
- with apples, beans, berries, broccoli, cabbage, chile peppers, cucumbers, gourds, kale, melon, mustard, peas, peaches, pumpkins, squash, tomatoes

CUCUMBER HERB WINE SPRITZER

- 3 mint leaves
 - 2 large basil leaves
 - Juice of ½ a lime
 - Ice
 - 6 ounces white wine such as Pinot Gris, Sauvignon Blanc or Viognier
 - 3 cucumber strips
 - 3-4 ounces plain or lime-flavored sparkling water
 - Garnish: *lime wheel, mint leaf & basil spike
- Instructions

Tear the mint leaves and basil leaves into large pieces and add them to the bottom of a wineglass or tumbler.

Add the juice of half a lime and use a spoon to stir, muddling the mixture a bit to release the flavor of the herbs.

Add ice to the glass, then the white wine. Tuck the cucumber strips throughout the mixture and stir gently to combine.

Top with sparkling water, then add the lime wheel and more mint and basil as garnish.

*A lime wheel is a slice of lime that's cut into a circle and used as a garnish for cocktails.


